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MAJOR DISPATCHES SOLDIERS TO CHECK ON FOOTBALL GAME

Oklahoma Governor Sends Off-Used Troops to Take Charge of Ticket-Booths At University Stadium

(By The Associated Press) NORMAN, Okla., Nov. 30 (AP)—Gov. William H. Murray has ordered his off-used troops to the University of Oklahoma campus today to check the gate receipts of the annual football game between the University and Oklahoma A. & M. College.

The national guardmen sent here from Chickasha took charge of the ticket booths and gates at the university stadium. The governor's order calling out the troops did not fully explain the action, but Adjutant General Charles P. Barrett said the purpose was to protect the university's athletic receipts.

Murray, Hearst Stories. "People here told the governor that athletic money is being misappropriated," Barrett said. "We are here to see that it is protected."

Governor Murray would not comment to check their favorites at games between old rivals. In many cities special church services were held.

CHILL WINDS END COAST HEAT WAVE

Record-Breaking November Weather Terminates With Threat of Light Frost

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 30 (AP)—Record-breaking November weather bid adieu to southern California today with chilly winds, dark, overcast skies and a threat of light frost.

There were a few moments of sunshine to recall the extremely high temperature of 96 degrees Fahrenheit set by a record of 96 degrees on November 13, a high equalled only once before, in 1920.

For six days the thermometer climbed above the 90-degree mark but at that the month was not the warmest November in weather bureau history. The average temperature was 63 degrees, three degrees cooler than November, 1932, which was the warmest on record.

The maximum average temperature was 78 degrees, six above normal and the average minimum was 48 against a normal of 50. Only twice before, with the exception of November, 1922, has this month been warmer in the history of the weather bureau. It was also the warmest in 1922, the warmest of those years averaging a degree higher.

In contrast to the 90-degree heat, records this month November closed with a maximum temperature today of 60 and December advanced to a threat of light frost.

HOOPER, ROLPH CLASH IN LYNCH LAW DEBATE

Ex-Soldier On List Of Missing 15 Years Dies In Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 30 (AP)—Frank Keyser, 54, who chose to remain some 15 years on the "dead or missing" list of American soldiers of the World War, today died in the street here. He was a victim of a heart attack which came just after he had decided to identify himself to government authorities.

His body was found near the home of Mrs. Esther Thomsen, where he had been visiting for two weeks. The police said that since he had been living under the name of Fred L. King, she had been revealed his true identity to her.

His sharp exchange of statements followed close on the heels of a public rebuke to Rolph for his stand condoning the lynching of John M. Holmes, a Negro, in the state of Missouri. The joint statement of a group was made yesterday by a group of prominent California citizens, including the former president.

MARYLAND DROPS PROBE OF LYNCHING

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# TAKE ROOT IN SOIL NAZI'S ADVICE TO AMERICAN FARMER

## German Minister of Agriculture Sees Brighter Days for U. S. When Mortgage is Prohibited

BERLIN, Nov. 30.—American agriculture can look forward to happier days, said the minister of agriculture today, only when and if the American farmer, like the farmer in Germany, is freed from his soil by land inheritance laws and prevented from mortgaging his land. The statement was made in an interview on the eve of Thanksgiving.

Speaking with the calm and positive confidence of a man who entertains no the slightest doubt that his ideas soon will prevail throughout the civilized world, the blue-eyed, blond, and youthful minister of agriculture today replied to the interviewer's question, "along what lines must American proceed in order to solve her agrarian problems, and why?"

Approves Special Basis  
"I note with interest how your great president lacks this element of problem of putting American agriculture back on its feet," Darro said. "I am convinced he is right in maintaining that nothing, except a special basis for calculation, will afford the possibility of restoring American agriculture, thereby giving new power to American farming."

"I do, however, your president will logically arrive at the conclusion that this aim can be reached only if the whole attitude toward the farmer in America is changed fundamentally."

More Than Economic Factor  
"This, I have already indicated, will be possible only in the presence of positive law, is enabled to avoid mortgaging his land and is thereby freed from the soil."

Such a measure for the security of farmers further renders inevitable the constant loss of one organization of all farmers' cooperatives and other bodies interested in the welfare of the farmer.

Such amalgamation would make stabilization of prices decidedly possible.

Born of a German father and a Swiss mother an Argentine soil and bred in England, the 33-year-old agricultural expert before Chancellor Hitler's accession spent much of his time in Poland, the Balkan states and East Prussia.

He bobbed with peasants as well as holders of estates.

On the basis of this experience he preaches the doctrine that the farmer is more than an economic factor, in the life of a nation.

# Engineer Haled In Court For "Blackmailing" King

LONDON, Nov. 30.—A half-breed, middle-aged engineer was hauled today in the Bow street police court yesterday on charges of trying to blackmail King George despite his claims that he was not a criminal and that he had always been "hounded" because he is the illegitimate son of his majesty's late brother.

The defendant, 43-year-old Clarence Guy Gordon Haddon, was accused of writing letters "demanding money from the king with menaces and without reasonable or probable cause" and was ordered kept in police custody for another hearing next Monday.

Haddon did not deny writing the letters, but contended it was in connection with his "right to live" as letters I write to the king to get the best of my life. I should be hounded for writing the illegitimate son of the Duke of Clarence," Haddon told the Bow street Magistrate, who arrested him.

The Duke of Clarence was the eldest son of King Edward VII. With the duke's death in 1922 the title became extinct. The duke was next in line for the British throne, but the present monarch became king when his father, Edward VII, died in 1910, as "an error," Haddon declared.

CLARENDON, Nov. 30 (AP)—Because he "squealed" to school authorities, a suspended student at the Genoa State Academy in England was arrested today by five American agents, including one girl, charged, threatened, tied and taken to the Cayman Islands, where he was threatened with lynching, Frank Meek, Cayman county prosecuting attorney, said today.

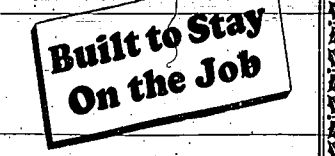
Three of the five participants in the alleged attack are in custody and efforts are being made by Sheriff Frank Pittman to apprehend the other two. All are said by Meek to be about 18 years of age.

According to Meek, the girl was used to lure the intended victim to an unlighted street. After the couple walked to this spot, a car appeared, four youths jumped out, blindfolded him and took him to the remoter, Meek said, where lynching was threatened.

Twelve persons die in 50 auto wrecks  
BOISE, Nov. 30 (AP)—Twelve persons were killed in automobile accidents during October this year, a report of the department of law enforcement disclosed.

Fifty automobile wrecks were reported, involving 78 drivers, of whom 23 were men. Altogether 33 were hurt in the accidents, bringing the total for the year so far to 900 injured and 81 killed.

# McGILL UNIVERSITY CHANCELLOR DIES

## Sir Arthur Currie, Famous Canadian Soldier and Educator, Answers Summons

MONTREAL, Nov. 30 (AP)—Sir Arthur Currie, commander-in-chief of the Canadian corps in France in the world war and principal since 1920 of McGill University, died today at the age of 61.

The famous soldier was taken to a hospital November 7 suffering from blockage of a brain vessel.

Arthur William Currie was born in Sturgeon, Middlesex County, Ontario, October 5, 1873. He went to the Pacific Coast in 1894 and took a military course at Victoria, B. C. He went overseas with the rank of brigadier general as commander of the Second Canadian Infantry Brigade in September, 1915. He was appointed commander of the first Canadian division, a post he held until he became a commander-in-chief of the Canadian corps.

Boyd Lay Currie, Sir Arthur's son, is a student at McGill, and one daughter, Mrs. A. T. Currie, lives in the city of Montreal.

His military career began as a gunner in the 7th Brigade, Canadian Garrison Artillery, in Victoria, B. C. He volunteered at the outbreak of the war in 1914 and reached France the next year.

In Many Battles

For the loss of his forces in the second battle of Ypres he was awarded the first order of knighthood and the Companion of the British Empire. He was made a commander of the Legion of Honor by the French government.

He participated in a number of important world war battles—Belgium, France, Italy, the Somme, and Vimy Ridge. After other honors he gained new fame with the Canadian Corps in the battle of Amiens in October, 1918. Belgium made him a grand officer of the Order of the Crown. France honored him with the Croix de Guerre with palms, and King George raised him to the honor of knight commander.

When he returned to Canada Sir Arthur became inspector general, the highest military office under the government. He relinquished the position after seven months and became principal and vice-chancellor of McGill University at Montreal.

"These gains, together with government loans to railroads for equipment and the public works program are at last beginning to reach the heavy industries which have been called the key to recovery. Steel production turned upward in the week of November 20, and the outlook in this basic industry has improved greatly."

#### IDAHO FINDS JOBS FOR 8,000 WORKERS

T. J. Lloyd, Civil Works Chairman, Now Looking For Places for Women

IDAHO, Nov. 30 (AP)—Idaho has found jobs for 194 of the 1,000 unemployed men under the civil works system and next Saturday will begin finding places for 1,000 women under the same assignment, T. J. Lloyd, Twin Falls, state chairman of the civil works administration, announced today.

The number 60 to go to work, including the women, is considerably in excess of the number originally assigned to the state, Lloyd said, as the first information indicated the 10,000 were to be all men and the 10,000 women were extra. Since then, he said he had learned the 10,000 men were to be included in the 10,000. Because the entire quota had been already absorbed by men, he had to make arrangements for a corresponding increase.

Extra Pay for Teams  
In addition to the men, all of which appear to be already at work, 1,000 teams have been put to work, their owners drawing additional pay for them.

Of those at work, 22 are time keepers who draw a flat salary of \$23 a week; 202 are foremen drawing \$20 an hour for a six-hour day, and 140 are unskilled men drawing 15 cents an hour for a six-hour day.

None of the employes is permitted to work more than 20 hours a week. The women to be put to work will be accepted in five classes, including stenographers, librarians, teachers and general help, including household servants.
