ROSS QUESTIONS
CHECKS STATEMENT

Idaho Governor Announces
Purpose to Investigate
Asserted Excess Grants

BOISE, Dec. 6 (AP)—Governor Ross said today he planned to investigate whether Idaho has received all of the public works allotments to which it is entitled, as stated by Secretary Ross of Interior.

Idaho was listed with a number of other states having received in excess of their share of the funds. Secretary Ross' administrative of public works, indicated the states would be notified within a few days. Further audits but requests would likely be curtailed until other states had received their share.

Several requests for public works funds have been sent to the board of Idaho which are not yet acted upon, including that for \$20,000 to Spring water from Stanley basin to Coe, Boise valley, and a number of municipal projects.

Secretary Ross was quoted in an Associated Press dispatch Tuesday night as having said all states beyond the fifty mountains have been granted more money by the public works administration than they were entitled to receive.

Arizona, California and Nevada, he stated, had received more than their share. Idaho had exceeded its figure by 150 per cent, Washington by 75 per cent and Utah by 170 per cent.

Arizona limits fixed. The fact that the states have gone over their share does not mean they receive no more funds. Projects will be studied on their merits, but no added money will be given. The state is not discriminatory.

No hard and fast sum was set for individual states. The limit for each state will be determined by the amount of population, unemployment, area and other factors.

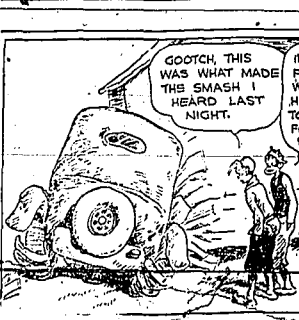

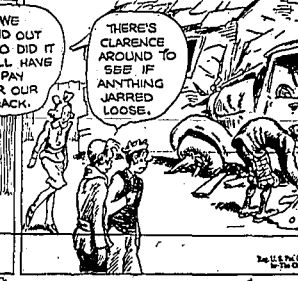

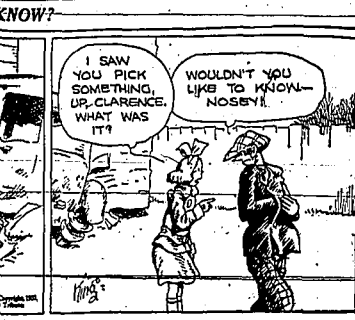
