NRA ENLISTS AID OF OTHER AGENCIES
Federal Trade Commission
And Department of Justice
Lend Hand in Enforcement

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7 (AP)—NRA yesterday widened the scope of its campaign for code compliance in its industry, calling for the first time upon both the federal trade commission and the department of justice to assist the aids in enforcement work.

To the department of justice the NRA requests that it be authorized to bring civil and criminal actions against violators of the code.

SHIPPERS BOARD SEES IMPORTANT CHANGES

POOATLELO, Dec. 7 (AP)—Members of the Central Western Shippers' board will prepare for "forthcoming momentous changes" in the transportation industry when they convene here on December 11 for a one-day discussion of shippers' problems with business representatives from six western states, according to W. L. Harvey of Denver, executive representative, who is here awaiting the conference.

Representatives of industry from Colorado, Idaho, Nebraska, Oregon, Utah and Wyoming and from 21 railroads will attend.

Feeling that the return to property rights of shippers is the only solution of transportation, Mr. Harvey said, the conference will be devoted almost entirely to explanations regarding laws changes which will be introduced at the January session of congress.

The meeting will be called for 10 a. m. by J. D. Rigney of Jerome, chairman of the Idaho division of the board.

WALLACE'S PLAN AIMS AT LESS CORN AND HOGS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7 (AP)—The \$60,000,000 corn-hog adjustment plan, new and largest of the agricultural adjustment administration, was announced today in production and raise prices, was announced Wednesday by Secretary Wallace.

In announcing approval of the contract under which farmers will be asked to agree to reduce corn acreage by 20 per cent during 1934, the secretary said the plan was designed to bring domestic production into line with present domestic consumption.

LABOR SEEKS REPEAL OF LONG, SHORT HAIL

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 7 (AP)—A plan for a campaign for repeal of the long and short haul clause of the interstate commerce act as a means of ending the present fight for hundreds of railroad labor organizations.

One representative from each brotherhood was selected to make up a central policy committee to be known as the Western Conference Committee of the standard railroad labor organizations.

The committee announced the plan to move today to repeal the long and short haul clause would result in the "elimination of the present regulation on a fair basis" against inter-railroad steamship lines for freight business.

"They considered the present regulations prevented the railroads from meeting the rates of inter-railroad shipping agencies, which the labor men held were virtually without regulation as to rates."

ALDRICH GIVES FINAL ADVICE TO COMMITTEE

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7 (AP)—Modification of the securities act and the deposit insurance provision of the banking law was recommended to the senate banking committee Wednesday by Wintonrop W. Aldrich, president of the Chase National bank.

The deposit insurance law, Aldrich told the senate group, might drive many banks out of the federal reserve system. He asserted the securities act, together with uncertainty over the value of the dollar was strangling the long term capital market.

In the course of his final oral examination by the committee, criticizing the two-month investigation of the bank Aldrich again condemned even more specifically than previously some of the practices of the federal reserve system which have been disclosed during the inquiry.

This renewed criticism of Wintonrop's methods was brought forth by a review of the disclosures of Ferdinand Pecora, committee counsel, who asked for Aldrich's views on the practices, one by one.

DEATH TOLL FIGURES IN PROHIBITION COST

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7 (AP)—Department of justice officials said today that 92 federal agents and 178 civilians had been killed in the prohibition era to enforce national prohibition.

Figures disclosed by the department said efforts to enforce the federal liquor law cost the taxpayers \$188,671,251 between January 16, 1920, and October 31, 1933.

Convicted over this period, the department said, totaled \$34,237,715. Fines amounting to \$60,370,012.77 were imposed against 69,764 persons. Records going back to 1920 showed 198,573 jail and penitentiary sentences were served out. Property seized under prohibition was valued at \$10,302,661.90.

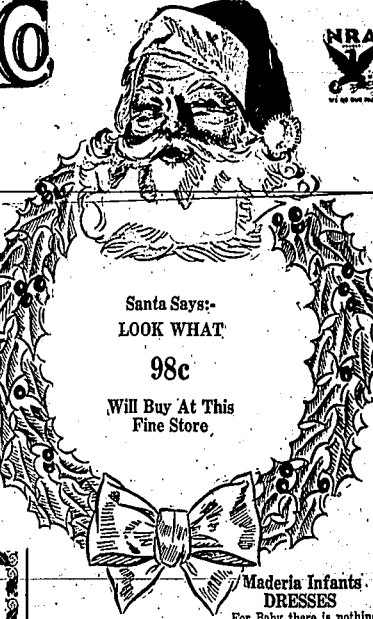

PROSECUTION LISTS EXTRA WITNESSES

State's Attorneys in Case Of Murder - Charged Man Present Two Motions

State's attorney prosecuting Lewis C. Hunter, farm laborer, on a charge of first degree murder of H. C. Letcher, Twin Falls actor, last November 17, will present motions in the district court here today for permission to file an amended complaint, and to place two additional names on their list of witnesses.

Trial in this case, the first of the numerous trials to be scheduled, is to begin next Monday.

The prosecution previously had listed 16 persons to be called as state witnesses at the trial.

Additional witnesses named by state's attorney are Ed Pettin and Harry F. Harris.

Williams, business associate of Letcher; Harry C. Goughlin, Dr. D. L. Alexander, Sheriff E. P. Prater; Deputy Sheriff Dick Cyster; Mrs. Iva Smith, attorney's office clerk, and H. M. Holler, justice of the peace.

E. W. Larson, former Twin Falls prosecuting attorney, was yesterday entered as associate counsel with C. W. Wyman, prosecuting attorney, in prosecution of Hunter.

Hunter's defense is to be presented by H. L. Harbison, Twin Falls attorney, who was appointed to represent him for this duty. Hunter was employed for a time last summer on Harbison's farm near Berger.

Hunter has been held without bond, a prisoner in the county jail, since he was arrested shortly after the fatal encounter.



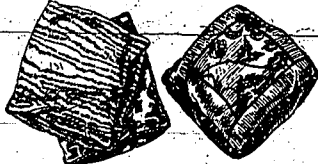

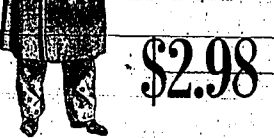
