FATHER ACCUSED OF BRUTAL MURDER

IRRIGATION DISTRICT SETS LEVY FOR 1933

ROBERT, Dec. 8.—Directors of the Irrigation District No. 1 on Thursday announced the operation and maintenance levy for the year 1933. The levy for the district and west of Snake river will be \$1.40 per acre and east of Snake river will be \$1.15. The difference in the levies represents the charge for operation and maintenance of the drainage system, which includes one-half the cost of operating the drainage pumps.

Water charges for 1933 become due March 1, 1934. If paid on or before that date a discount of five percent will be allowed. If not paid when due a penalty will be assessed until paid in full when a penalty of one percent per month will be added until paid.

CARBON DIOXIDE WELL COMES IN WITH ROAR

NELAND, Cal., Dec. 8.—A dry ice speculator's dream of riches from a carbon dioxide well was to be abandoned today as a well in a roiling, miniature volcano failed to erupt.

E. J. Pratt started drilling six days ago when clouds of white steam manifested the dry ice. As he reached the 100-foot mark the well went dry. He had been told that the well would be steadily increasing in size until it now measured 100 feet across and is booming steadily larger, with hot mud, steam and gas spurting over the land.

Resident ranchers near Mounds complained to the oil and gas division at Sacramento while drilling frantically tried to stop the gusher. The well tower is nearly 200 feet high and only the hood of the truck on which it had rested may be seen above the hot steam.

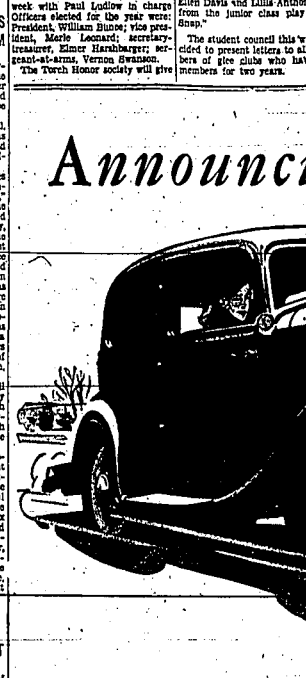

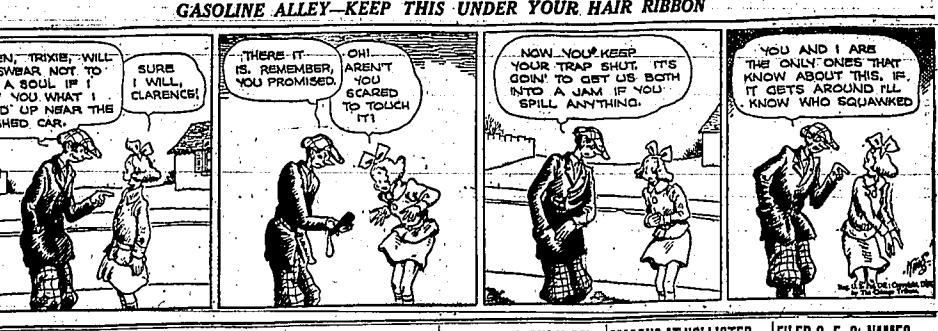
