WORTHLESS CHECK FED TO MURDERERS. CONVOY ASSERTS

Jack Wisdom, 26, Klamath and Killed Wife's Couple To Escape Prosecution, According to Confession

HUTCHINSON, Kans., Dec. 11 (AP)—Jack Wisdom, 26, cowboy, made a statement this afternoon, Assistant County Attorney Ed. Bohnke announced today.

The statement, obtained at the Klamath County jail where Wisdom is held for safe-keeping, did not mention "Red" Smith, who Wisdom admitted killed the couple while he looked on.

Wisdom, according to the statement, had been in the Klamath and killed the bodies in Oklahoma because he feared prosecution on a worthless check for \$100 which he had given the Wichita merchant.

"The Only Way" The statement was made public by Bohnke, who is assistant district attorney here, to assist in identifying the bodies.

"Just like the evening I was taking to the killing of Mr. and Mrs. Hutchinson on Thursday, November 23, 1932.

"I went to meet with Mr. and Mrs. Hutchinson in the Panhandle of Oklahoma, where I was for this here check, and wanted the money right then and insisted on having it in cash."

"I got out of the jail and I got the money for him but failed, and I couldn't get it. The only way I could think of to make with going, which I did on the road south of Wichita, Kansas."

"So you did form the intention of doing away, or killing Mr. and Mrs. Hutchinson in Red Rock county, Kansas?"

"Yes, you carried out, your designs or plans in Sumner county, Kansas, two or three miles north of Wellington."

"I carried I, Jack Wisdom, made the above statement knowing full well the contents of the same and knowing that it was a confession in case of trial to help me out."

"I was held in the jail in Wichita, Kansas, where I was held for the purpose of being taken to the Klamath County Jail in Klamath Falls, Oregon."

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MERCHANTS REPORT STRONG RETURN OF BUSINESS IN WEST

Gains Most Marked in Mountain States, According to Summary Completed by Federal Reserve Bank

(By Walter Warren, Associated Press Financial Writer) SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 11 (AP)—The monthly survey of the Federal Reserve bank of San Francisco, completed today, shows a strong return of business in the western states.

The monthly survey last completed by the statistical staff of the Federal Reserve bank of San Francisco shows the seven states in the twelfth district reported sales 2.2 per cent above November last year. This wiped out the lag of nearly 9 per cent reported in October. The survey covered 80 stores.

Forecast of new minimums last night had sent anticipatory shivers down the spine of many retailers in Chicago, Cleveland, Detroit, Baltimore, and Louisville had been reported to expect a drop from five to 10 degrees, and the western states were notified the night would bring even more.

IDAHO MAN'S TRIAL IN TEXAS COURT DELAYED

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

APPROPRIATION FOR COURT COSTS SHORT

County Commissioners Set Up Emergency \$7000 Fund; First \$4000 Gone

A \$4000 appropriation for district court costs in Twin Falls county during the year beginning last January 1, was only a little more than one-third the sum actually required, county commissioners decided yesterday when they voted to set up a \$7000 emergency fund to meet court costs that had not been forecast.

The original \$4000 appropriation was less than that provided for this fund in previous years.

Cost of the trial in Ada county of the late Mrs. M. E. H. Foster, was acquitted on a charge of kidnapping P. J. Prince, Twin Falls, was a big item in the unexpended court cost.

Marking a further advance in the county's financial condition, commissioners yesterday passed on record the deed for the 40-acre tract purchased by the late Mrs. M. E. H.
