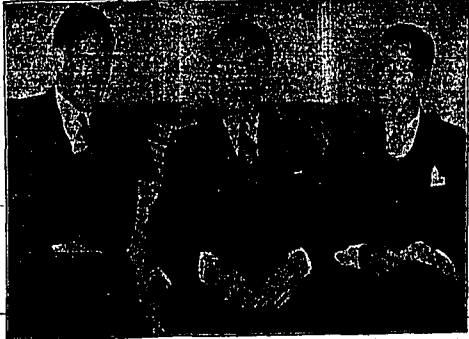

### COUNCIL REMOVES WATER RESTRICTION

#### Civil Works Projects Make Possible Extension of Service Lines

Civil works administration projects have made possible construction of Twin Falls filter water supply so that the city council in regular session last night could, and did, vote unanimously to reverse action recorded in July, 1932, and to re-establish water service to all city lots.

J. Long, chairman, addition, a former applicant, and Fred L. Latham, member addition, were the first to vote in favor of the resolution. Their applications were approved by council last night.

For Tunnel Sinks Sewer  
Proposing construction or extension of a tunnel sewer sewer for the next civil work project for the city. The addition of the Addition Avenue conduit and burying of the Eighth Avenue conduit, have no objections to proposed improvement of the sewer system as a part of a project in which the city should have an interest.

The proposed purchase of a considerable amount of privately owned land which would have to be purchased, as advised, for the purpose of the city operation and maintenance of the proposed park at \$200, including building and light for 12 months at \$200, and insurance and operation with light guard at minimum price for six months at \$200.

Purchase of the property involved would require a bond issue. Lem A. Campbell, city engineer, has advised, and annual expense for maintenance and operation probably would require an election each year to authorize a tax levy in addition to the present light maximum levy. Civil works projects have been up to now have involved no liability to the city but, on the contrary have been profitable to the city.

Save Filtered Water  
Construction of the 300-foot Addition Avenue conduit has made possible the elimination of the 175-foot conduit through the alley between Third and Fourth streets and the 100-foot conduit in the alley between Third and Fourth streets, which would be a saving of \$15 a month for maintenance, and which could now be used for other purposes for less than \$50, the major saving going figures supplied by the city engineer.

The Addition Avenue conduit also made possible the construction of the city's filtered water supply and extension of water service lines beyond the city limits, by eliminating the later discovered use of approximately 13 inches of 24-inch pipe for irrigation of 12 acres of land north of town, and by permitting the installation of a hand pump through which raw water will be drawn for street sprinkling in the best quarter of the city. Value of 19 inches of filter water was estimated by the engineer at \$600 per day. Through use of raw water for sprinkling in the north quarter it was estimated a saving of \$15 a day would be effected, and \$1000 worth of filtered water made available for delivery through meters.

Council adjourned on the mayor's motion to re-convene Tuesday evening, January 2, bringing two regular meetings which would fall on Christmas and New Year's day.
