NORTHWEST'S MOST DANGEROUS FLOODS TAKE TOLL OF LIFE

More Than 5000 Persons Driven From Homes at Kelso; Nine Killed and Hundreds Marooned With Little Food

Seattle, Dec. 22 (AP)—The most dangerous flood conditions in the history threatened the waterlogged Pacific Northwest tonight, with breaking dikes, overflowing rivers and continued rain requiring a hourly toll of lives.

Foundation of the city of Kelso, Washington, seemed imminent as the Columbia and Cowlitz rivers broke through their levees and started to sandbag the business district, the Cowlitz ran 2 1/2 feet deep, and the Cowlitz was only 18 inches from overflowing.

More than 5000 persons were driven from their homes, nine were killed, directly or indirectly, hundreds were marooned in the upper reaches of houses and barns, without food except when officers could bring it to them.

Record breaking rainfall poured down highways, halted trains and cut communications. Train service had been suspended for several days.

All of Washington, much of Oregon and Idaho, and eastern Washington and a great section of British Columbia suffered from the deluge.

One death was added to the storm toll tonight, the total to date when R. J. Ford, Portland, a CWA worker at the Portland city waterworks plant at Bull Run, was drowned when he touched a fence, charged by a high power line being dragged against it.

DELUGE MENACES OREGON VALLEYS Heavy Rains and Melting Snows Threaten Willamette and Columbia

Portland, Ore., Dec. 22 (AP)—Continuing rains and melting snows conspired today to threaten the Willamette and Lower Columbia river valleys, and threaten serious flood menace in years.

The exceedingly heavy rainfall and unseasonably high temperatures have brought about a serious threat of serious flooding in years.

Many highways in the northwestern corner of the state were blocked by flood waters and earth and rock slides.

All motor traffic to Seattle was shut off by slides, floods and washouts.

Gales Blasted Oregon, Idaho and Washington for more than a week, diminished to comparatively mild blizzards.

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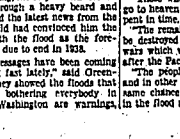
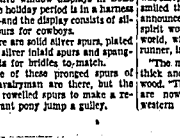
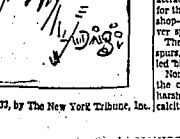
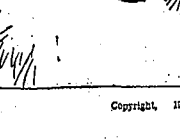
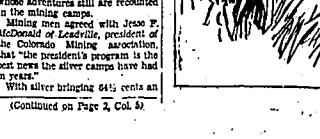
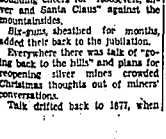
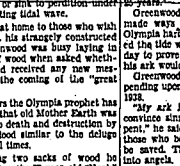
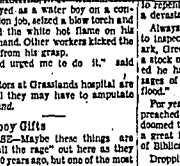
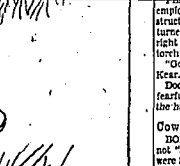
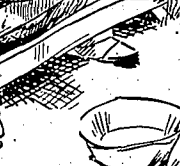
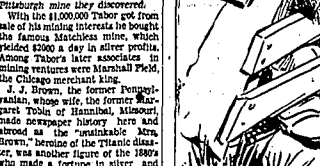
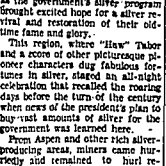
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JAPAN CELEBRATES BIRTH OF PRINCE

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U.S. Farm Leaders Study Dairy Plan

Administration Proposes to Curtail Production and Pay Cash Benefits

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (AP)—Farm leaders who conferred today with Secretary Wallace and members of the farm administration approved most of their line to discuss a proposed plan under consideration of a \$300,000,000 plan to reduce dairy and beef production.

With a critical situation in the dairy industry and a beef program growing more acute daily, the administration proposed to the conference its plan under production of milk and its products and beef would be curtailed and cash benefits paid.

This plan was believed by officials to have forestalled criticism from the dairy industry over what it deemed to be a lack of the administration in carrying out a program to reduce milk and butter prices.

Secretary Wallace telegraphed members of the acute and house principal committees, producers of agricultural beef and dairy products from presenting letters to congress that an "acute dairy and beef price situation requires immediate action and asked for their comment.

The \$300,000,000 fund would be used, Wallace said, to supplement proceeds from processing taxes in the financing of important programs for production adjustment for dairying and beef industries.

Secretary Wallace reported on progress in applying the farm adjustment act to support and domestic commodities and discussed the adjustment program ahead of the administration.

He said 30 supplementary foods, such as cod liver oil, Dr. J. P. McDonald reported.

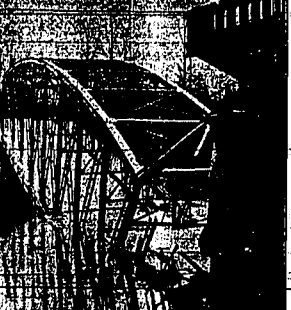

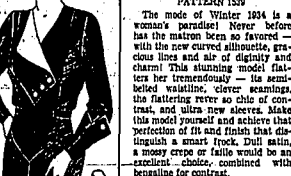
FIRE MELTS HIGHWAY BRIDGE

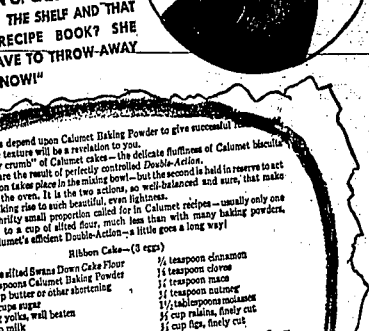

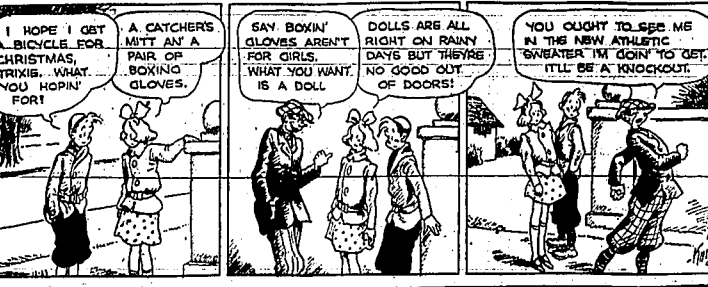
