Crystal Formations and Rock City Fascinating to Amateur Geologist

Fascinating discoveries of southern Idaho rock crystals and semi-transparent stones are held by a Kimberly girl who has labored industriously to work out a background of knowledge for her interesting pastime. The City of Rocks of which she speaks can be reached either through Shiner or Oakley and is made up of semi-transparent stones brought about by the work of wind and weather. Her story follows:

In a recent issue of The News I read the article about the gem display of Mr. Hayes, Boise attorney, and decided to tell you of the discovery of semi-transparent stones in the mountains near Burley that we made on recent excursions into the desert and mountains near there, and heard about from the residents. The beautiful pits are filled with agate and other stones. The agate is of various colors and is very beautiful. It is not always found, and the colors are usually yellow and white, or mottled with black or brown, and they are also thought to be made into rings or pin settings.

Other clear stones are filled with bits of clear and brilliant glass, and are thought to be made into rings or pin settings. They are not diamonds nor rubies, but they are very beautiful. They are described by A. J. Anderson in the Bulletin No. 14, which was compiled by him at the University of Idaho, as a complete survey of "Geology and Mineral Resources of Eastern Cassia County."

There are also small garnets included in white limestone formation, and of course, quantities of obsidian, which is valuable only in arrowheads and jewelry. An interesting place of all, is the City of Rocks, between Almo and Oakley. There, one resident told me he picked up a piece of garnet about one-half inch long and had it made into a setting for his wife's ring. Other stones of similar discovery, and a Burley Jeweler showed me some nice agate and topaz crystals from the same region. The agate was a large crystal of white topped at the end with violet, and the topaz was smoky topaz.

The best specimens of rock crystals I found were somewhat cloudy with the lime inclusion, and have been called beryl, by an old man of the mountains, mountains, by a Jeweler, and quartzite by a science professor, and a rock crystal, or corundum.

Topaz, amethyst, ruby, garnet, sapphires, emerald, and aqua maris are common (aluminum and silica), but are colored by different inclusions. Iron color the rubies, garnets and crimson sapphires; iron and manganese give the violets, etc.

The interesting material surrounding the quartzite is nothing more nor less than our beautiful character rock that we are using abundantly at this season, and that hangs literally in abundance on the huge monoliths at the entrance to the City of Rocks on the Oakley side of the mountain, and is both reddish and greenish in color.

The Bulletin No. 14, the state geologist made that "The City of Rocks" is within 40 miles of "The City of Rocks" and could be made an interesting trip for the thousands of tourists who cross the northern end of the district without knowing of its presence. It is a scenic source of great worth, as yet virtually unexplored."

"The crystals of mountains that I discovered near Oakley are interesting because of the fact that they occur in other rocks in huge boulders and are sometimes red, though mostly white."

The strong, garnet, topaz and rock crystals from the City of Rocks are the best specimens we have seen of Idaho gems of present day service, with the dark, unbroken carat of ocean may have borne for all we know, but our agate collection, while not so handsome as some, is interesting."

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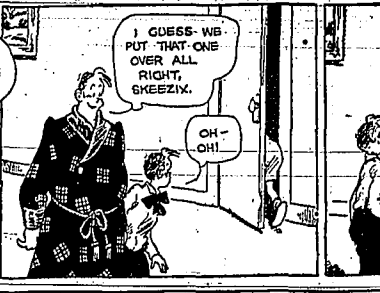

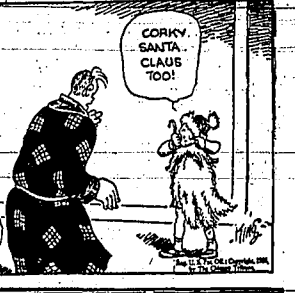

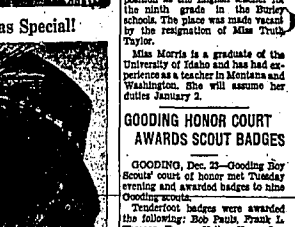
