Volcano, Typhoon and Tidal Wave Take Toll In Philippine Islands

At Least Nine Persons Killed and Much Property Damaged, According to Reports Received at Manila

MANILA, Dec. 25 (Associated Press)—At least nine deaths and much property damage were reported from a volcanic eruption and a typhoon and tidal wave in the Philippine islands today.

The bureau of posts reported four bodies recovered and many persons missing and a ship lost today. Senator Jose V. Reyes reported by telegraph that nine bodies had been recovered from the sea near the beach of the Iroin river were reported carried away by a flood of sulphuric water pouring from the beach.

Dispatches from Zamboanga in Mindanao province said a typhoon and tidal wave had damaged the island and had caused much destruction. Floods, not connected with the volcanic eruption, were also reported to have swept through the coastal sections of the Philippines.

The Buluan volcano in Negros island erupted yesterday in a series of Volcanic eruptions and typhoons in the Philippines have caused scores of deaths and done untold property damage.

Perhaps the most disastrous volcanic eruption was that of the Taal volcano, 60 miles southeast of Manila, which erupted in 1911 with a loss of 123 lives.

This eruption was preceded by a series of earthquakes, 400 tremors having been recorded at Manila in 1910 to 1911.

Several volcanoes are generally active in the Philippines and a chain of volcanoes extends from the Bataan peninsula near Parnassus south to Mount Apo, over 9000 feet high, in southern Mindanao. Only a few of the volcanoes still are active.

Typhoons also have added to the volcanic still are active in the islands.

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

TEACHER RESIGNS IN SCHOOL PROBE

Head of Kindergarten Denies Charge of Cruelty

STANLEY, N. J., Dec. 25 (AP)—Mrs. Krueger, head teacher of the Arthur Sunshyne Home and Kindergarten in this town, following a public hearing on charges she had used unnecessary force and brutal measures in disciplining the children.

The board of trustees, in accepting her resignation, stated that "the evidence does not indicate that the superintendent has merited the characterization of a 'cruel or brutal person.'"

The board also said "this investigation has demonstrated that the superintendent has had certain experiences and attitudes which have been employed in the care of the children."

Cruel Punishment

The public hearing was conducted by William J. Ellis, state commissioner of institutions and corrections, by Miss Edna H. Ennis, a teacher at the school, that the children had been punished with cold showers, adhesive tape on their hands and mouths; that they had been locked in closets and that they had been told they were having their throats cut or their hands cut off.

Denies Charges

She denied she had threatened to cut off their hands and that she had been present when a laborer sought to frighten a child by pretending to cut his throat.

Three nurses in the home praised the superintendent's work and said her punishments were not cruel. After charges and defense were heard the trustees went into a closed meeting which Mrs. Krueger attended. She said she "appreciated the expression of confidence and trust in me relative to the findings that I am not guilty of any brutal or inhuman treatment of the children and that they love me," she said.

Kathleen Norris Convinced She Is 'Last Living Dry'

NEW YORK, Dec. 25 (AP)—Kathleen Norris, the writer, returned from her trip around the world with her husband, Charles Norris, with the conviction that she is the "last living dry."

LACK OF AIRPLANES SERIOUS FOR NAVY

Chief of Naval Aeronautics Points to Shortage of Ships and Pilots

WASHINGTON, Dec. 25 (AP)—Revelation of the navy's aviation activities spearheaded by placing aircraft on their ship was said by Rear Admiral Ernest J. King, chief of the navy bureau of aeronautics, to have created "a serious situation."

In his annual report to Secretary of the navy, King disclosed that the addition of 15 new heavy cruisers, the aircraft carrier Ranger, and six amphibious transport ships will total 211 planes from his navy's 1,000 plane program.

This has forced the navy to reduce activities authorized under the 1,000 plane program by 212 airplanes, King said, "consider it essential that early legislation be enacted to provide for an increase in the 1,000 plane program in order to give the navy airplanes necessary for national defense."

DISMISSING PERSONNEL

The admiral noted that as of last July 1, the force was about 100 heavier than in 1937 and that this deficiency could not be made up until 1945 if the present rate of commissioning officers were followed.

CUBAN COURT FREES 404 FORMER OFFICERS
