CHAMBER'S QUIZ DARES BUSINESS REACTION TO NRA

Surveys Indicate Majority Of Those Questioned In 100 Cities Find New Deal Detrimental In Some Lines

WASHINGTON, April 30 - The board of directors of the chamber of commerce of the United States will toll its convention opening tomorrow that a majority of business men responding to a questionnaire said NRA had been detrimental to them along some lines.

This disclosure was made tonight in a summary of information from organization members in more than 100 cities, which was tabulated as the result of two surveys in January and March.

The summary also reported that with many such industrial developments there had been a marked reduction in unemployment figures in 1933 and 1934.
