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DISCOVERY OF CAR REVIVES DILLINGER SEARCH IN CHICAGO

Police Comb-Haunts of Dettlaw After Finding Bloodstained Machine Stolen From South St. Paul Man

(By The Associated Press) CHICAGO, May 2 (B)—John Dillinger, much-sought Indiana outlaw, was apparently hiding here tonight.

Police prepared for a re-combing of his haunts after finding late today the bloodstained automobile stolen by Dillinger, henchmen from a St. Paul man in the mad dash from raised little Bohemia in northern Wisconsin a week ago.

On May 2, a man was seen on a street on the North Side. The machine was fitted with Illinois license plates, but the henchmen licensed machine by the motor numbers.

The front-seat passenger, with hands and feet bound, was in the automobile when it was abandoned. The automobile was found on the floor of a house on Sunday.

Standing near the intersection of Leavitt and Roosevelt streets, not far from where C. J. Winkler was slain the other night, the car was found with a baby's crib and blankets in the car when it was abandoned early in the morning.

Residents of the vicinity said the automobile had been abandoned there last Sunday night. They said it had apparently been abandoned around 3 a. m.

The abandoned car was in the same place as that driven by the gunmen who slayed a suburban Bellwood policeman with a machine gun in a shooting in May 1933.

Several copies of paper matches advertising the resort of Lake Umbagog, Illinois, were found in the car.

Also in the car were a copy of the Dubuque, Iowa, newspaper telling of the search for the Dillinger gang, including a police tip that the gang was in Chicago.

The car was stolen April 23, the day the shooting in the woods from Roy Francis, South St. Paul, was testified by Dillinger in an attempt to make his wife a baby.

FIGHT ON TARIFF PROPOSAL CENTERS UPON AMENDMENTS

McNary Says Opponents Will Endeavor to Prevent Lowering Duties on Any Farm Product Under New Policy

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 2 (AP)—A call for Republican senators to meet Friday to discuss the reciprocal tariff bill was issued today by Senator McNary.

McNary, the minority leader, said the senate finance committee had favorably reported the measure.

At the conference the Republicans, almost unanimous in their opposition to the proposal to give tariff-making power to the president, all draft their campaign.

McNary has said an attempt would be made to insert a number of amendments one of which would prevent the lowering of duties on agricultural products.

This would prevent, among other things, any reduction in the rate on sugar, a step planned by the administration to help Cuban.

WASHINGTON, May 2 (AP)—Hugh B. Johnson took a vigorous defense of NRA today to an annual meeting of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

Henry J. Harriman, president of the chamber, told the delegates that "economic horizons have indeed brightened" and that a high mark of unemployment had been reduced from nearly 13,000,000 to 4,000,000.

CONGRESS TO ACT ON HOUSING PLAN Proposal Stated to Appear Before Lawmaker For Decision

2000 Police Besiege District In Paris As New Violence Flares

Reinforcements Settle Down To Night of Watchful Waiting Following Sharp Street Encounters

PARIS, May 2 (AP)—Communist-headed police-fired snail in street battles tonight among the teeming lumps where May Day rioters had rained pistol fire and bricks on guards a few hours earlier.

Several hundred manifestants at a meeting at the "Joan of Arc city" municipal apartment—which riotists say is a revolutionary center—ripped up newly repaired pavements and attempted to burn a hardware store.

Police reinforcements again besieged the huge tenement block which served as the red capital during sharp encounters between last midnight and 5:30 a. m., today, in which 20 communists were injured.

Police swinging their clubs energetically dispersed the bands. Then the officers, numbering 1000, surrounded the buses surrounding the block, leaving one street occupied by 100 menacing snouts.

Police subsequently settled down to a night of watchful waiting following a practice they used earlier.

In the first encounter a sensational attack on May Day women and children in the crowded tenement 4000 persons fled in the 2000 cars which were stuck in the streets.

LEWISTON, Idaho, May 2 (AP)—The State Department is expected to announce the appointment of a secretary of state, subject to the approval of the Senate.

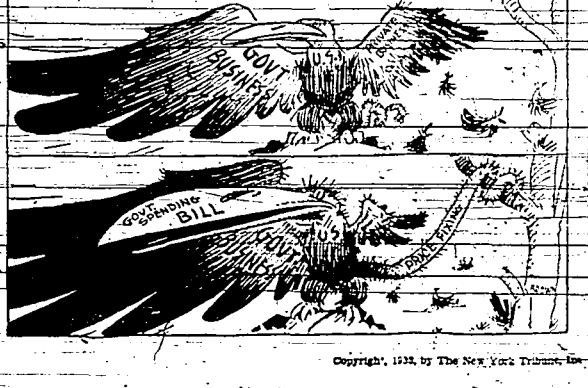

INQUEST PROBES DEATH OF WOMAN
American Falls Man Charged With Murder, Awaiting Chemist's Report

BURLEY, May 2—A coroner's inquest today into circumstances surrounding the death of Roy Taylor, a local hospital patient Saturday night, adjourned here this afternoon to await a chemist's report on contents of the dead girl's stomach.

Known as Bonnie Lee, the girl, who was known also as Bonnie Lee, came to American Falls, Idaho, to live at a number of local hotels, according to testimony at the inquest today. She was the daughter of Mrs. George Stone of Driggs, Idaho. Two brothers arrived Sunday and will return with the body to Driggs to be inquest today.

The girl was in the hospital for a number of days before her death. She was found in a local hotel where she and Wilson were guests, occupying different rooms.

Overl Bros, hotel employe, testified Wilson called on Saturday evening to see her at the hotel. He said he believed her to be dying. The girl came to the hotel with a man and a woman.

Trene Moeckel, local cafe employe, testified she had served a meal to Miss Stone and a woman companion. She said she saw Miss Stone appearing to be in a state of collapse. She corroborated statements of other witnesses that there was no drinking.

Attorneys for Wilson, Roy L. Black of Pocatello and E. J. Johnson of Burley, attended the inquest. After hearing the testimony of the three named witnesses, to await the chemist's report.

FORMER JEROME DOCTOR SUMMONED

Dr. J. F. Schmershall Fails To Rally From Coma; Son Arrives

Dr. John Frederick Schmershall, 67, for the past 25 years a practicing physician and surgeon of Jerome, succumbed to the effects of diabetic coma yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock at his apartment in the Boyd building here, after an illness of 48 hours. Dr. Schmershall established practice in Twin Falls about a year ago.

His son, Peter Clark Schmershall, chemist, arrived from Los Angeles yesterday, an hour before the father's death. He is assisting his mother, Mrs. Agnes Schmershall, in completing funeral arrangements. Services will probably be held tomorrow at Jerome. The body rests at the White mortuary.

Dr. Schmershall who came to Jerome from Chicago, engaged occupationally for 24 years in his profession at Jerome until a year ago last spring when he became a patient at Good Samaritan hospital, Portland, for three and one half months. Following treatment for diabetes, he was able to resume his professional duties at the end of that time.

He was born June 13, 1866 in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. He received his medical degree from the Hanman Medical college, Chicago, Illinois. Dr. Schmershall was the president of the South Side Medical association and a member of the Masonic lodge at Jerome.

At one time Dr. Schmershall was a member of the state board of medical examiners.

MURTAUGH DISTRICT TO CONTINUE FIGHT

Claim for Alleged Over-Assessments Goes to Supreme Court

Twice overruled in the district court here, Murtaugh highway-district attorneys to the state supreme court its claim for \$12,544 from the Twin Falls highway district on account of alleged illegal assessments of highway bonds fund levies since 1922, attorneys for the Murtaugh district announced after District Judge W. A. Babcock yesterday sustained Twin Falls district's demurrer and ordered dismissal of the Murtaugh suit.

In argument yesterday the Murtaugh district's attorneys set forth its claim for an accounting and for credit for the amount claimed and for a restraining order forbidding assessment of bond fund levies except in proportions agreed upon when the Murtaugh district was created one of the Twin Falls districts in August, 1922.

At that time, counsel for both districts agreed Murtaugh district's valuation of the original Twin Falls district, which previously had issued \$1,000,000 of bonds. Subsequent assessments, the Murtaugh district asserts, have been made on a changing scale of relative valuations of the two districts and valuation in the Murtaugh district has increased proportionately.
