GOVERNMENT RULE IN STOCK MARKET OKEHEKED BY HOUSE

Supporting Forees - Brush Aside Weakening Amendments to Record - Final Approving Vote, 280 to 84

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 4 - Government regulation of the nation's stock exchange was voted by a dominant bipartisan majority today in the house.

The ballot brought 280 votes for the measure and 84 against.

So great was the support attracted by the legislation that efforts to attach weakening amendments were defeated and the only change made in the committee draft was those which the committee itself found acceptable.

It now goes to the senate where a measure similar to that passed by the house is being considered.

Blue Grass State's Turf Classic Attracts Notables

Kentucky's Famous Triad - Thoroughbred Race Horses, Beautiful Women and Fine Whiskey - Come Into Their Own Again

ROBERT KAY (Associated Press Staff Writer) LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 4 - Turf throughbred, beautiful women and fine whiskey, the triad for which the Blue Grass state is famous, will come into their own again tomorrow at the sixteenth running of the Kentucky derby, the race that annually launches the battle for the three-year-old championship among race horses.

The mint julep and whiskey soups, as well as the horse races, attracted a featherweight championship boxing match, the first leg title bout in Kentucky's history.

There is no doubt as to the quality of the horseflesh that will parade to the post in the famous race, and a few will dispute the Kentucky tradition that the Kentucky derby can be matched nowhere for a high average of attractiveness.

CHAMBER REFRAINS FROM ASSAULT UPON NEW DEAL PROGRAM

Harrison, Friendly to Administration Aims, Re-Elected President - 'Be Careful' Advice to NRA

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 4 - Regulations which criticized details of the Roosevelt program but refrained from assault upon it as a whole were adopted today by the Chamber of Commerce of the United States at its final session.

The chamber demanded revision of the securities act and temporary suspension of the proposed stock exchange regulation but 'be careful' admonitions aimed up its reference to the NRA and the farm administration.

Henry I. Harrison of Boston, friendly in the main to the administration, was elected president of the chamber.

Wallace Talks Restrictions Secretary Wallace, one of the financial spokesmen of the chamber, said the cotton program was an instance of farm administration success.

Other centers still complained of big labor trouble, but the only one of big jobs of legislation was at Hammond, Indiana, where refinery workers are on strike.

The chamber endorsed the principle of the proposed National Labor Relations Act, but suggested an amendment to assure industry that they will not be placed at a disadvantage.

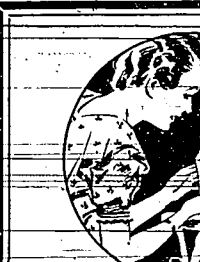
