A strong high covers the Northwest, with its crest over Eastern Washington. Fair weather prevails within the mountain region.

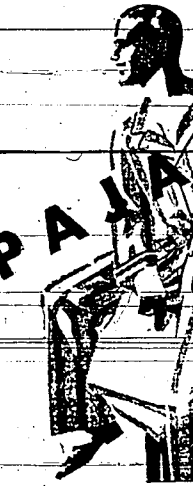

# RELIEF MONEY FOR IDAHO CURTAILED

## State Administration Announces \$155,500 Available for April

BOISE, May 9 (AP)—Idaho's 44 counties will share \$155,500 in work relief money for April, the state relief administration announced today.

April expenditures totaled \$250,000 plus \$74,000 which was spent in excess of the allotment, and which must be deducted from the May allotment of \$260,000. This deduction, together with \$30,000 allowed for overheads including rents, administrative forces here and in the five districts, and other incidentals, will reduce the May work relief amount to about \$175,000 below what was spent in the two weeks of April while it was in operation.

# Meningitis Puts North Idaho Camp Under Quarantine

LEWISTON, Idaho, May 9 (AP)—French Creek camp in Clearwater national forest, three miles northwest of Pierce, yesterday was reported in working quarantine because of meningitis among the CCC men of Company 1893, consisting largely of men from the Fort Sherman district.

Adam Cragg, Chicago, the second victim tonight was in the Oregon hospital, reported improving following an injection of serum.

Major Henry C. Davis, commander of the 4th division, is in charge of spreading the disease outside the confines of the camp and that every precaution is being taken to keep the men in the camp. They are continuing their regular work and are being vaccinated.

It is the second case of the disease in the company in 20 days. Joseph Dorner, of Chicago, died in Deer Lodge hospital after his removal from the train as the tree trappers moved west.

# IDAHO GRADUATES TO HEAR PLANNED

## Marshall Dana of Portland Commencement Speaker At Moscow

MOSCOW, Idaho, May 9—Selection of Marshall N. Dana, associate editor of the Oregon Journal, Portland, and chairman of the Pacific Northwest regional planning commission, as speaker at the University of Idaho's 39th commencement has been announced by President M. G. Neal.

Mr. Dana has been connected with the Journal for 23 years. In his editorial work he has been concerned largely with Oregon and Pacific Northwest development projects. He is a member of the board of the Oregon reclamation congress, the Portland community club, the public welfare bureau, and is a former chairman of the Oregon State college commission. In July, 1933, he was appointed by President Roosevelt as regional advisor of the public works administration.

The university's 1934 commencement takes place June 9-11. Alumni activities dominate the stage Saturday. The Rev. Saml. A. Eliot, minister of the Arlington Street church, Boston, will deliver the invocation. The Rev. Eliot is a son of the famous Dr. Charles Eliot, for 40 years president of Harvard university.

Dedication of the memorial constructed from the steps of the original Administration building of the university will feature this year's commencement. The memorial is now dedicated to the memory of the late Saml. A. Eliot, minister of the Arlington Street church, Boston, oldest member of the university faculty, will be presented to the institution Sunday. The painting was finished by alumni and friends of General Christmas.

**In contrast,** he said, in the Pacific Northwest "there is a section I have visited that does not have marvelous crops. Vegetables and other crops are in much better condition than normal, and there is sufficient moisture in the ground."

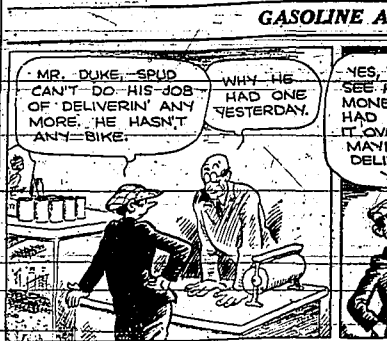

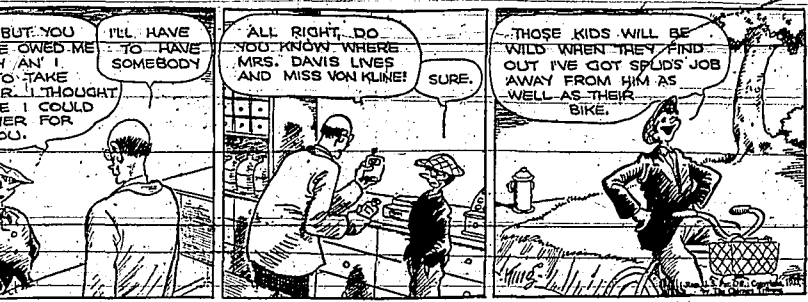
