Victims of Two Kidnapings Found Unharmed

Gangsters, Trapped In Own Lair, Give Up Captive Millionaire

Sudden Raid On Residence Uncovers Hideout Of Kidnapers And Victim; Officers Roundup Suspects

(By The Associated Press) LOS ANGELES, May 14.—Trapped in their own lair, the kidnapers of William F. Gettle, oil millionaire, fell into the hands of the law here today by more police guns and their victim was found virtually unharmed.

A sudden raid by police and sheriff's officers on a small house in La Crescenta, north of Glendale, uncovered the hideout of the snatchers and their victim. The kidnapers broke and ran. One was captured and police later seized three men and two women associates as suspects.

"It all seemed like a bad dream," said the worn and haggard millionaire as officers stripped him of his pants and deluged him in his seriously stricken invalid wife and four children.

The greatest worry, while I lay bound hand and foot on that bed was for the anxiety my absence would cause my wife, my family and my added fear that my officers had treated him well.

Officers waded into the case after reporting for ransom—\$100,000 for \$50,000 had been thwarted early in the kidnapping.

It was what officers described as a "typical kidnapping" case. The kidnaped man had been taken last Wednesday night at his country estate in La Crescenta, near Los Angeles.

Last Saturday, Captain Harry Baker, of the police robbery squad, reported they overheard a conversation in which the speaker said, "the newspapers look favorable. We led the wires to link them with the kidnaping."

Today the hideout was raided and three persons taken in custody. Jimmy Kirk, 38, Lorena Woody and John Henry Williams, 30, who said he was a ranch hand and automobile mechanic of Chino, was taken through Tucson at the time.

Mystery Note Leads To Desert Prison Of Little June Robles

Child, Chained In Cactus-Covered Hole, 9 1/2 Miles From Home, Releases Herself When Rescuers Supply Key

(Copyright, 1934, By The Associated Press) TUCSON, Ariz., May 14.—Chained in a cactus-covered hole in the desert that soon would have become her grave, little June Robles was found alive today, 9 1/2 miles from Tucson, and thus ended one of the most spectacular kidnaping cases that ever aroused the southwest.

Following instructions in a special delivery airmail letter received from Chicago in the office of Governor B. B. Moeur in Phoenix, Clarence Houston, Pima county attorney, and James B. Robles, an uncle of the missing child, were dispatched on the 65-year-old girl whose abduction April 25 stirred the one time frontier country into strenuous action for days.

Chains were on her ankles; she was described as "quite ill" and too weak to talk but authorities said the doubtless would recover. She was deeply unharmed and covered with the dirt of the desert.

Over the grave-like hole in which she was found was a cactus of the Palo Verde variety. It had been broken and the uncle said the child had been kept there 19 days. "I was able to get her out of the hole," he said.

FLIERS PIERCE FOG ENROUTE TO ROME

Sabelli and Pond Radiate Confidence as They Head Eastward

NEW YORK, May 14 (AP)—Bound on a non-stop flight to Rome, Cesare Sabelli and Captain George B. Pond roared aloft from Floyd Bennett field early today, sped up the Atlantic coast and tonight, apparently, were piercing low-hanging fog off the Grand Banks to reach fair weather over the open ocean.

The hazardous objective on this inaugural flight of the 1934 trans-Atlantic season never before has been attained. Six lives have been lost in the trying.

But Sabelli, who made one of these attempts in 1928 with Roger Williams, and Captain Pond, a former navy pilot who is no novice to long-distance flying, were confident.

As they lifted their 300-horsepower, orange-and-maroon monoplane, "Leonardo da Vinci," from the Brooklyn airport in a perfect take-off at 6:25 a. m. (E. S. T.), Pond cried out to a handful of friends bidding them farewell:

"We'll make it all right. Everything is in our favor."

Their monoplane—named after the great Italian artist-engineer who centuries ago tried to conquer the air with machines—carried 650 gallons of gasoline, sufficient for 45 hours.

The distance to Rome is 4500 miles. The fliers expected to make it in 49 or 50 hours.

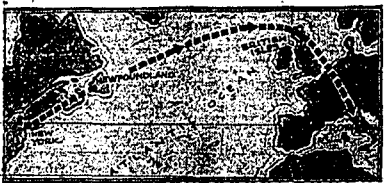
If successful, the fliers were calculated to reach their destination around 9 p. m. (E. S. T.) Tuesday.

Follow Famous Course
