Break in Gas Line Forces Rome-Bound Aviators to Earth in Ireland Following Hop—from New York

(By The Associated Press) LAHINCH, Irish Free State, May 15 - Barely escaping a plunge into the sea, Capt. George Pond and Lieutenant Cesare Sabbelli, brought their Rome-bound monoplane to earth on a sandbank here early tonight. The main connection between the gasoline tank and motor of the craft broke just before the New York fliers came down on a small field about an acre in size.

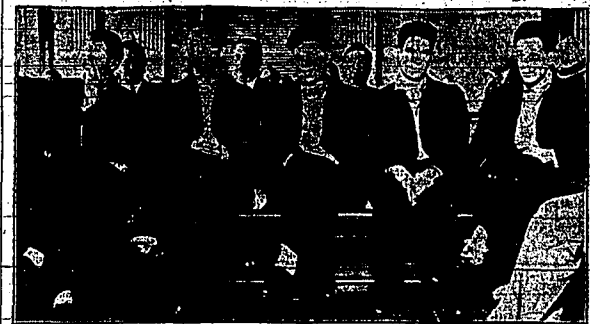
SCHOOLS CLOSE WITH GRADUATION PICNICS

State unemployment insurance is less desirable than federal insurance. This meeting was described as "the first successful attempt in the state to organize student opinion, the future balance of political power on the crucial political issues of the day."

Such activity, now growing throughout the country, may come to something. It may yet be regarded as even more important than college athletics.

HONESTY AND GETTING AN OFFICE: There never has been a time in all of American history when the political situation in the United States has been quite so chaotic as it is today.

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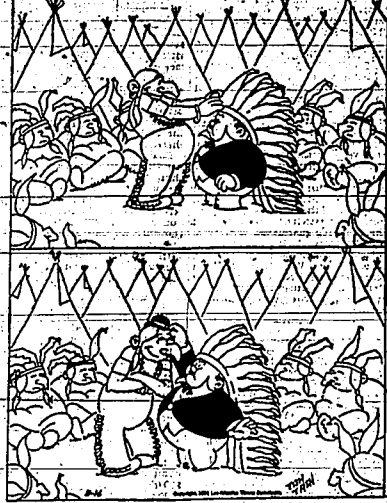

Emphasizing the thought that FERA is primarily to supplement other employment, Masterson said that applicants for FERA work who refuse other employment will be dropped from FERA rolls, unless they can produce good reason for such refusal.

Emergency employment, he said, is simply an economic guarantee of 26 weeks work each year. An excess of work will be done during several weeks or months at other work and then, if he needs additional help he will be called on for 26 weeks work on FERA projects.

"You're not telling us the truth because you had a recording instrument planted in your room, and we know just what took place. "Well, I can't help that. There was nothing ever mentioned about any kidnaping."
