SOUND VIEWS

Imprisonment for life may be all right for the three men so far arrested and who pleaded guilty to kidnaping William F. Gettle but we rather like the views expressed by S. S. Van Dine, New York writer and author of some of the country's best crime and detective stories.

Mr. Van Dine, whose real name is Willard H. Wright is not only a literary figure of note and an art critic of recognized standing but he is also a student of crime and criminal reactions and a keen analyst of social tendencies. Mr. Wright, or Van Dine, declares that both the legal system and the psychology of the people favor the criminal rather than the victim and that the cure for crime is "capital punishment, actually applied."

Commenting on the case of six year old June Robles he says: "If taking an innocent child like the Robles girl and shackling her in a narrow pit for nineteen days in an Arizona desert while the kidnapers dickered for a few thousand dollars, not knowing whether the child would die a horrible death from heat and starvation or not, is not a crime calling for swift capital punishment, then I should like to hear some sentimental criminal-coddler explain to me the moral intricacies of this attitude."

The administration of capital punishment he characterizes as "theoretical" and "law bookish," applied in so small a proportion of cases that it is practically inoperative. "Criminals," he declares "know this and count on it."

Three of the kidnapers are duly sentenced to life imprisonment in the Gettle case but the presiding judge takes occasion to inform all and sundry that they would be permitted to apply for parole because the crime was not accomplished by violence.

AN INTERESTING POINT

Mrs. Harold L. Jekes, wife of the secretary of the interior struck an interesting note when she said, in an address delivered before the national Congress of Parents and Teachers now in session in Des Moines, "Reading is yielding to the radio, writing to the typewriter, arithmetic to the adding machine and simplified spelling is upon us."

There can be no question but what modern education takes less and less note of the old rule of three R's. Good penmanship is almost a rarity, reading is rarely inquired of except that sort which is done for one's own benefit, and arithmetic exists only in the higher brackets, as it were. Yet this does not constitute a condemnation of the new methods. Junior students today know a little about many things and presumably they can later develop this knowledge with respect to those subjects in which they are interested. They know few things thoroughly and they are not always sure of the knowledge which they do possess. But they have more in the way of initiative than former generations of youth and perhaps on the whole they are better equipped for the business of life than they once were.

But the words of Mrs. Jekes reach the older generations with something of a shock. They confirm a strong suspicion in many minds that modern education teaches too many things to make a really good job of any. No doubt the educational authorities know what they are doing but the stu-

RUIM ROW

A newspaper man who has no prejudice against alcoholic liquor—who has drunk and studied it in almost every big city in the world—visits Chicago to see how the Demon Rum is making out there under the new liquor deal, and is horrified. Drifting along Madison Street for a couple of hours between trains, he finds a situation which he describes, in small part, as follows:

"It was not a long walk, but it was long enough to suggest the alternative to rigid state control of the booze business. 'Approximately every other door in this squalid and populous street leads to a bar room of a type that preserves all the delicate elements of most reprehensible old-time saloons. A corner cluster of these unsavory refresheries in one block. For a dozen blocks they are the main, almost exclusive, business of the street.

"A few of them are comparatively clean and orderly-looking, ringing their vast supplies of bottled claret in neat shelves and barrels. The rest of them are dirty, greasy shops of the kind found in the worst slums of London, though not in such numbers. They are situated in the most desirable blocks we have attained such squalor in the short months since the repeal of prohibition.

The reader will be spared further details. The general view, as presented by an expert judge, is bad enough. And a man need not be a fanatical Volsteadian at all to wonder how many such streets there are, in America, and whether the public is going to continue tolerating them.

THE WOODLAND FOREFATHER

In the early days of the American republic Thomas Jefferson and Alexander Hamilton were arrayed against each other as leaders of opposing schools of thought on the national constitution.

Jefferson was a particularist. He maintained that the constitution was inflexible. It meant what it said and no more. Legislation of doubtful constitutionality was wrong morally and legally. Hamilton was of the broad construction school. He believed that the authority was given and should be exercised for the national government to do as it deemed in internal affairs.

So strict a constructionist was Jefferson, and so firm in his idea of the inflexibility of the constitution, that Alexander Johnson, writing fifty years ago, said that "much which is now taken as strict construction would have seemed to Jefferson the loosest possible." And much that in 1934 is taken as strict construction would have seemed loose construction to Alexander Johnson.

SCOTT HALL HITS 'BORAH REPUBLICAN'

Every Tub Stands on Own Bottom, Candidate Says Defining Issues

W. Scott Hall of Malad, a candidate for the Republican nomination for congressman from the Second Idaho district, commenting on the announcement of another candidate for the same nomination that is a "Borah Republican," yesterday gave out a statement in which he gave an opinion on the subject.

"I am as much opposed to anyone trying to capitalize the personal popularity of our distinguished senator as I am against anyone trying to capitalize the bogus popularity of a supposed-to-be Democratic president," Hall's statement follows: "I notice that one candidate for congressman announces that he is a 'Borah Republican.' I rise to ask what kind of a cockeyed Republican is a Borah Republican? I have been a consistent, persistent supporter of the president until my memory runs back to the time when it was not so. I have fought for him, suffered for him, agreed with him, disagreed with him, rejoiced in his achievements, grieved for his failures, and withal have a deep and abiding affection for him that is not based on political considerations. The senator knows all this very well. I doubt if he knows what a Borah Republican is. I don't think he would want me to be a Borah Republican any more than he would want to be a Scott Hall Republican.

Makes Annual Report
 Miss Fraser has released the annual circulation report, which shows a total registration of 3,077 readers. The largest circulation month was in January of this year when 1,242 volumes and periodicals were taken out of the library.

The numbers of volumes in the library last May—14,007—and 14,814 this year, the report shows. Of these there were 223 discarded; 117 volumes donated; 654 books purchased and 1632 books and magazines bound.

The library subscribes regularly to four newspapers; eight are donated regularly; 86 magazines are subscribed to and 23 donated.

REMOVERS OF TIMBER MUST PRESENT PAPERS

BURLEY, May 16—Timber permits may not be issued to those removing timber from the Malheur National Forest for sale, unless application papers have been procured from the Western Pine Association, 1000 Union Building, Portland, Oregon, S. St. Street, forest supervisor, has been advised that sale of poles, posts and other timber procured from national forests comes under the provisions of the NIRA, and that almost must be procured from the Malheur forest from the local office or from forest rangers. Only for timber for their own use may permits receive permits from the rangers.

It is explained in the instructions received at the local office that distribution will be made for three months periods, and that distribution will be equalized. It is pointed out that the purpose of the code is to do away with the creation of air-poles, and that unfair competition must be restricted. Therefore, blanks must be procured from the Forest office before the granting of allotments. Such blanks must be filled out specifying the location of timber. It is proposed to remove from the forest for sale, together with other necessary information, Forest officers dealing timber for their own use are excluded from the provisions of the ruling.

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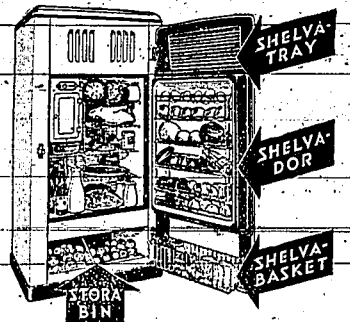

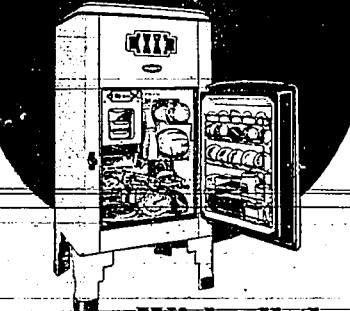
