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BANK BANDITS GET \$30,000 IN BARRING MICHIGAN ROBBERY

Raid on Flint Institution Snacks of John Dillinger's Methods; Search for Gang Extends Throughout State

(By The Associated Press) FLINT, Mich., May 18.—A "scafed" machine-gunned raid on a branch bank here today and, although it was "doubtful if the nation's No. 1 "bad man" himself was a merchant, police suspected that John Dillinger's gang had replenished its war chest with \$30,000 more of bank money.

It was a typical Dillinger job, carried out in the early afternoon of \$100,000 in armored cars from the home office of the Chicago Commercial and Savings bank, but a multiplicity of identifications cast doubt upon the actual presence of the notorious fugitive.

Claims It Was Dillinger Kirk Roland, a customer, first claimed that it was Dillinger, and all, who prodded him with a machine gun and threatened to "put your arms over your ears" over other members of the robber gang had been identified by various witness photographs, as the chief suspect.

The only member not so identified was a woman who had been seen with a machine gun in the trap while the robbery was in progress.

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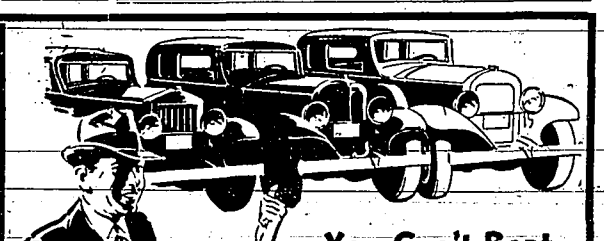

THE TEN MILLION

The big question is not how many people are back at work, but how many are still out of work. On this point it is easy to deceive ourselves.

Back of the unemployment is the relief it requires. And the volume of that relief shows the ground still to be recovered. Here are some facts.

The area hardest hit by the depression was the "American Ruhr," the industrial area extending from Pennsylvania westward into Michigan. Its center is Cuyahoga County, which means Cleveland.

Yet in Cuyahoga County last month there were over 42,000 families dependent on public relief, more than ever before. Many thousands have gone back to work, but those left are nearer the bottom of their resources.

In the country as a whole there are still 10,000,000 out of work. All our public problems today center in their problem.

A TRUCK DRIVER

Drivers, on the whole, are a selfish and reckless lot, but truck drivers are probably better than most. Here's a little story.

It was the rush hour on a big city thoroughfare. A large truck lumbering along was suddenly seen to slow up and swerve toward the left, the driver signaling to the traffic behind and ahead to hold back.

Then suddenly the man in the car behind him saw what it was about. A two-year-old child had toddled into the street and started diagonally across the truck driver was blocking the street for her, saying nothing to her for fear of frightening her.

BOYS GO VISITING

On the whole, one suspects, a pretty good time was had all around. Hospitality has a way of breaking down barriers. Its recipients feel kindly toward the hosts even if the latter do have different manners, menus and speech.

Unfortunately, this is the attitude on which all restriction programs in commodities encounter either wreck or difficulty. It broke down the old rubber agreement. It is preventing cooperation in American domestic petroleum. The idea is for the other fellow to limit production.

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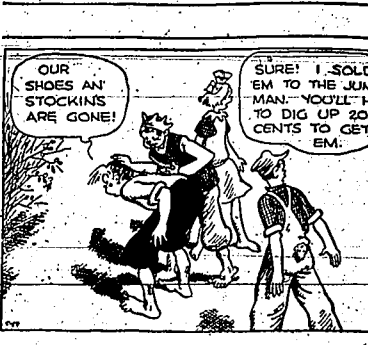

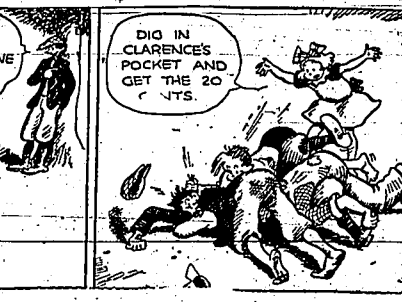
