ROSS DELVES INTO REGIONAL PLANNING

Governor at Burley Stresses Seriousness of Drought Conditions

BURLEY, May 24.—Before a group of business men and farmers, following a dinner at the National hotel, Governor C. Ben Ross yesterday afternoon stressed the seriousness of the regional planning board and urged the cooperation of a study board to bring about efficient cooperation.

"Drought conditions in Idaho," he declared, "are the most serious problem for immediate consideration. Overhauling all other difficulties pointed out by the governor to investigate drought conditions estimated the drought damage for the coming season at between 25 and 30 millions of dollars in the state. The estimated losses on irrigated farms, Ross asserted, amounted to about \$10 an acre.

Relief from future seasons of water shortage can be secured, he declared, through conservation of flood waters escaping to the Pacific, by abandonment of marginal lands to a limited extent, through development of wells, through diversion of headwaters flow of Yellowstone park waters toward the Pacific, and the Gulf toward the Pacific.

Board Considers

An engineering board, headed by R. W. Paris, has been considering plans for water conservation during the next few years. The board has estimated the cost of such a project at between 16 and 20 million dollars. The board has submitted to the state planning board. One of the serious problems to be overcome, Ross stated, was the over-irrigation of land considered vital that some power plants must be abandoned or transferred to other locations.

Government Obligated

The governor asserted it as his belief that the government is obligated to care for the unemployed. The thousands of ancient Egypt, he declared, found work for the unemployed by building the pyramids. We have no pyramids here, he said. We have idle men. Following the starting of the CWA in Idaho, over 70,000 different people in Idaho were put to work. At one time he reported to the governor's office an increase in business arising from 10 per cent to 300 per cent. Referring to salaries he said that although the farmer did not believe it, his salaries were favorable to the farmer, in that reasonably high salaries promote prosperity.

Highway Improvement

Highway improvement, he asserted that if the present highway bill passed the senate, that about 15 million dollars would be made available for Idaho for this improvement. Whether the highway would be continued on west from Burley along the proposed new route, he declared that nothing would be done until the people of Burley buried their differences and got together. If they did not do so, the highway would be postponed another year with the prospect of being it altogether.

WORLD-WIDE DROUGHT-LIFTS FARM PRICES

WASHINGTON, May 24 (AP)—American farmers suffering from drought had word today that other world-wide drought conditions of similar fashion and, as a result, world wheat prices may be higher during the coming marketing season. The bureau of agricultural economics, in reporting on the May price situation, forecast "moderate strengthening" of world prices as the result of drought damage in the United States, Canada and the lower Danube basin.

BOISE, May 24 (AP)—Mrs. Myrtle P. Enking, state treasurer for the past term, today announced her candidacy for re-election, subject to the Democratic primaries. Before election she was for several terms Gooding county auditor. In her announcement she said: "Believing my administration had been reasonably satisfactory to the people of the state, I am entering the Democratic primaries for re-election. I am asking the support of the party at large for nomination, and, if nominated, of the voters generally for re-election in November, as state treasurer."

DROUGHT CUTS DEEP IN IDAHO FARMS OUTPUT

BOISE, May 24 (AP)—T. J. Lloyd, director of rehabilitation of the relief administration, and W. W. Goodyear, surplus commodity director, left today for Salt Lake City for a conference here tomorrow in which the drought relief program will be discussed. Mr. Goodyear is expected to return from a meeting in Kansas City Saturday in time to attend the Salt Lake meeting at which time not only the drought problem but the entire agricultural rehabilitation program was to be discussed. Lloyd carried with him reports indicating drought had caused a 51 per cent reduction in 31 per cent in the wheat crop, 30 per cent in other grain crops, 41 per cent in alfalfa, 31 per cent in beans, 24 per cent in peas, 25 per cent in peas, and 25 per cent in potatoes.

INQUIRY ORDERED IN EX-MINISTER'S DEATH

BOISE, May 24 (AP)—An inquest into the death of Luther A. Lowry, former Christian minister of Jerome, will be held here tomorrow to investigate the accident causing the fatal injuries. Coroner J. T. McCann impounded a jury today to view the body prior to funeral services this afternoon. Lowry was injured in an intersection collision Sunday and died Tuesday, his lungs punctured by a broken rib. Bernard High, 17, of Boise, was driver of the car which collided with the one driven by Lowry. High was taken to a hospital slightly cut and treated, but later released. Zeida Lowry, daughter of the former minister, remained in a hospital with a back injury received in the accident. Lowry was minister of the Christian church in Jerome several years ago, returning to go into the extract manufacturing business.

SUGAR PRICE REDUCED

SAN FRANCISCO, May 24 (AP)—Sugar refining companies announced today they had reduced the price of the commodity 10 cents per 100 pounds, making the cane base price \$4.10 and the beet \$4.40 wholesale. It was understood here the lowering of prices was done to meet competition of eastern refineries.

CHRISTIANITY SEEN AS NEW DEAL BASIS

Secretary Takes Pictures Social Objectives, Invites Church Aid

CLEVELAND, May 24 (AP)—National leaders of the Presbyterian church in the U. S. A. were told tonight the "new deal" in the government is based on the fundamental tenets of Christ, himself. The speaker was Secretary of the Interior Harold T. Ickes.

Addressing a public meeting here, Secretary Ickes declared that the new deal is based on the social objectives of Christianity and the new deal is being identified with the "new deal" in the government. He wanted men and women to live upright lives, but he also wanted them to have for each other understanding and good will and mutual "helpfulness," the secretary said. "He wished them to be good neighbors, he hated injustice with a passion, and he hated a life which was a fight against oppression. This was the man who stood out. The money changes from the temple."

Asserting the new deal is an opportunity for the church to aid in a Christian work, the secretary then invited the leaders in the church to establish social and economic justice so far as lies within the power of man, wholeheartedly or only reluctantly? The answer to this question, he said, is important because if the church is to be a real force, it should reinforce the political efforts now being made to establish a new social order, the advance along the line would be feasible and that new social and economic order, certain as it is to be realized in the end in any event, would be accomplished much more quickly and with intrinsically less disturbance.

POCATELLO, May 24 (AP)—Apollis "Pop" Briggs, 66, committed suicide, a coroner's jury decided yesterday following an inquest into the death which occurred Monday. Briggs was found dying Monday morning in the blood-spattered house where he and his estranged wife, Myrtle La Force, lived. Briggs and the woman had been fighting just previously, officers stated, and she has better several told them, before he took his life with a razor. Briggs met death "by wounds self-inflicted on the throat and wrist by the jury reported."

REHEARING DENIED IN CHAIN STORE TAX SUIT

BOISE, May 24 (AP)—The state supreme court today refused to rehear the case by which it upheld the constitutionality of the chain store tax in a suit brought by J. C. Penney company and the Salfrey Stores, Inc. The petition for a rehearing was filed soon after the original decision was handed down holding that the tax, which ranges from 45 cents for single institutions to \$500 a store for those in chains of 20 or more, did not conflict either with the state or federal constitutions. Observers expected the case to be carried to the United States supreme court. It involves annual tax aggregating \$40,000 a year for the two companies, as well as additional amounts assessed against other chains in the state.
