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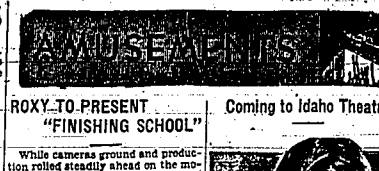

A CLARIFYING DECISION

Idaho is to be congratulated on the fact that the Supreme Court has disposed of for all time the question of the right of the State to invest school endowment funds in school-district-tax anticipation notes.

During the financial emergency which existed in Idaho a year or two ago the endowment funds were freely drawn upon in this way until around a quarter-of-a-million dollars was in use by the State and the endowment funds account was carrying a corresponding amount in these tax anticipation notes.

The decision clears up a point of the highest importance with respect to the operation of the finances of the State of Idaho.

FIRE DEPARTMENT ECONOMY

PEGGING RUBBER PRICES

Just when motorists are beginning to enjoy the delights of the open season, with all its altitudes to travel and touring, the specter of higher-tire costs bounces into the international economic picture. Word comes from London that the governments of England, France, Holland, India and Siam have gone into a huddle to effect a restriction in the production of rubber.

This scheme sent rubber prices skyrocketing to \$1.25 a pound and caused strong protests from the American government. It failed of its objective because the United States had no rubber production outside of the British Empire.

Apparently there is little that American interests can do to check the scheme, extend their own facilities for growing rubber, or possibly to develop synthetic rubber.

It should be borne in mind that in tropical countries outside of the British, French and Dutch colonies there are extensive areas which could be profitably used for rubber production; that the Firestone company has a million-acre tract under lease in Liberia; that Henry Ford's rubber-growing acres under cultivation for the purpose in Brazil, once the synthetic rubber experimentation has convinced the experts that it is rubber prices advance to a certain point or that it will be profitable to undertake the manufacture of this synthetic product.

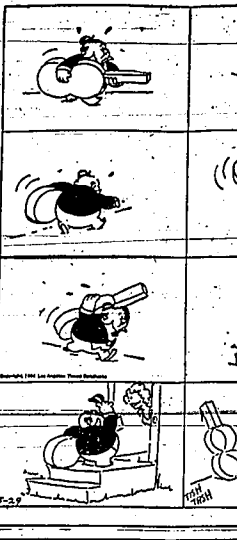

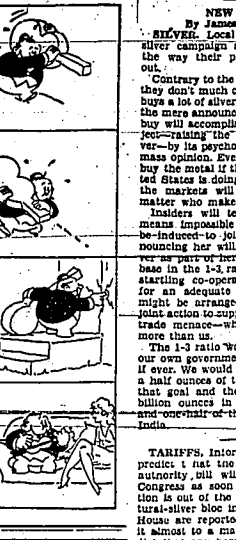

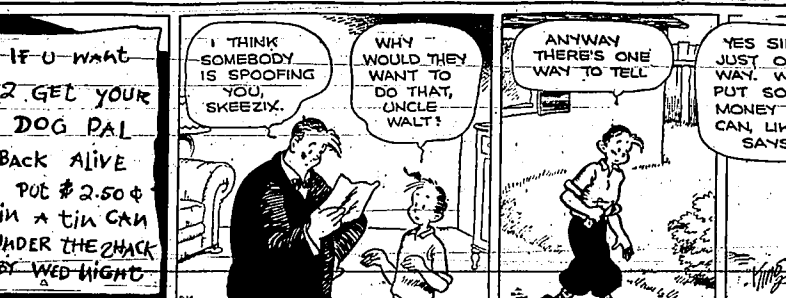

### SHERIFF WOUNDED WHEN PISTOL FALLS

#### Bullet Plows 15 Inches Through-Flesh Paralleling Bone

A bullet fired from Sheriff E. F. Prater's 38 caliber automatic pistol when it dropped on the floor in his apartment yesterday, entered his right leg at the knee and plowed directly upward a distance of 15 inches, emerging at the hip and imbedding itself in the ceiling. Only a painful flesh wound was inflicted, the attending physician said. The apartment was in the sheriff's quarters, where he remained under treatment.

A former Twin Falls county sheriff, who had been in the office for 25 years, was accidentally shot and severely injured when his revolver dropped from the holster and struck him on the floor in a court house lobby here a number of years ago.

### SETTLEMENT URGED IN PIPE LINE SUIT

#### Court, Denying Temporary Injunction, Counsels Agreement

Denying a temporary injunction, Judge W. H. Black in the district court here yesterday advised Twin Falls city administration and commissioners of Twin Falls highway district to work out an agreement for removal of a 1.75 mile pipe line which the highway district asserts in the way of state and federal construction of a \$70,000 highway construction project, covering the seven-mile Godwin-Twin Falls loop of United States highway route 22.

The highway district brought an injunction to require removal or repair of the pipe line, which the district alleged to be a nuisance.

Urging an agreement as a means of avoiding costly litigation between two public corporations, the court remarked that "sooner or later the pipe will have to come out of the highway right-of-way."

Only the question of issuance of a temporary injunction was at issue yesterday in hearing and the district's claim on its merits was yet to be disposed of.

#### No Other Channel

In argument, J. W. Porter, who appeared as associate for the city attorney, George M. Paulson, argued that no emergency was involved in the highway district's claim, because the highway district has been authorized for some 15 years, and that there is no other channel for necessary water.

John E. Hayes, city engineer and former Twin Falls Canal company manager, testified 42 test holes indicated the pipe line is in good condition, and that repair would not be expensive.

J. D. Sinema, engineer for the highway district, told of an agreement under which Twin Falls Canal company would permit of wasting water from the filtration plant through a pipe extending in another direction to a coulee.

E. M. Swedley, former city attorney, and W. J. Swedley presented the case for the highway district.

### FIVE DENY GUILT OF HOLLISTER BURGLARY

Accused of five degree burglary in connection with alleged theft at S. B. Hahn's store at Hollister last April 21, five Filer men pleaded not guilty when they were arraigned before Judge Guy L. Kinney in the probate court here yesterday. Preliminary hearing was set for June 12, 7, and each was admitted to \$1,000 bond, which was not furnished. One of the five, Herbert Mungler, 22, Filer, was represented by an attorney, E. L. Rayborn of Rayborn and Rayborn. The others are James Heppner, 27, Dan Hesse, 26, Carl Heppner, 29, and Jack Goff, 32. Warrants for the arrest of Mungler and Dan Heppner were served in the county jail where they are serving jail terms in lieu of payment of \$100 fines under legal process pronounced last May 9 for illegal possession of liquor.

### DESERTION, CRUELTY DIVORCE SUIT BASES

Alleging desertion and a studied campaign of cruelty since that time, Mrs. Lorena Conwell started suit in the district court here yesterday for divorce from Dale Conwell, Filer Falls, to whom she was married at Idaho, Nevada November 4, 1921. She asks also for \$100 a month for support of herself and 14-month-old boy, O. C. Hall in her attorney.
