However, since accommodations have been increased by the erection of a new dining hall by P.E.R.A. workers, a few children over the age limit will be accepted if the committee is assured there will be no problem of crowding.

CLASS HAS MEETING

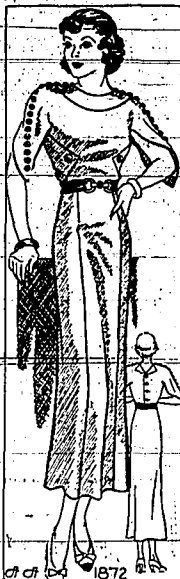

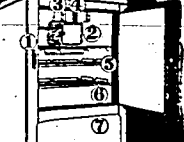
