Hitter Falls in Purpose

To Oust Von Papen, New League Chapters Come to Light in Nazi 'Blood Purge'

BERLIN, July 4.—Germany's "sturdy oak" President Paul von Hindenburg, refused today to bow before the will of Adolf Hitler, and the president's power, Franz von Papen, kept his place as vice chancellor of the reich.

Hitler, who a few days ago ruthlessly killed his enemies in the next party, came back to Berlin after a tour from which he returned with the 88-year-old president.

Shortly afterwards, it was announced that von Papen, who is not a Nazi but is a critic of the Nazi policy, would keep his position.

Until yesterday it had been the plan of the "brown" party to remove him from office and give the second place in the cabinet to Herman Goerring, chief of the Nazi "Blood Purge" campaign.

"On 'Leave of Absence'"

When the "resignation" of Hitler was forthcoming as expected, Hitler was explained as a "leave of absence" from the office of the president.

The announcement that von Papen will remain in office was accompanied with official information that he might go on a "leave of absence" shortly.

It was explained that the middle-aged conservative vice chancellor has been in bed for some time and his condition is such that he will be unable to attend to his duties.

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BUSINESS OUTLOOK FAVORABLE DESPITE MID-SUMMER LULL

United States Swings Into Last Half of 1934 With Successful Drive Toward Better Times

(By The Associated Press)

NEW YORK, July 4.—Workday America enters the last half of 1934 with its arduous trek toward better times interrupted by a pronounced mid-summer lull in business, but that in itself may be regarded as indicating a return to normal conditions.

After registering striking gains over 1933 in the first and second quarters of this year, business appears to be entering the third quarter well under the levels of last year. But in view of the highly artificial conditions prevailing last year, comparisons with 1933 may be misleading.

The first five months of 1934 were marked by the banking crisis, ending in the bank holiday in March, and the late spring and early summer of last year saw a feverish inflationary flare in business conditions leading to leaving the gold standard, and efforts of manufacturers to bring costs under the mounting taxes and the NRA code.

Things have proceeded more smoothly this year. Labor troubles, the same drought in the middle and northwest, and changing attitudes toward prior fixing under the NRA code, has injected some difficult problems, but they were nothing compared with the ordeals of last year.

Production Months

The Standard Statistics Co. index of industrial production, after holding around 95 per cent of the 1926 average in the last two months of 1933, rose steadily during the first quarter of this year, reaching 100 per cent in March. It then slid a little in the next two months, but came back to 100 in the March-June period. In February 1934, the index was at 100, the same as in March of last year.

Factory payrolls have expanded further this year, reaching the best level since December of 1929, and the dollar volume of retail trade has shown striking gains, although cur-

Exhibitors Plan Action Following Boycott by Church Members

PHILADELPHIA, July 4 (AP).—Motion picture theatre owners in Philadelphia and vicinity announced today they will shut down numerous theatres in the city and vicinity if church members, in protest against alleged indecent movies, fail to attend the theatres.

The announcement came jointly from Warner Brothers, which controls 75 theatres, and independent exhibitors.

On behalf of Warner Brothers, Leonard Schlegel, zone manager, said the firm gave two weeks notice to exhibitors in preparation for closing theatres.

Joseph Bernhard, general manager of the Warner theatres in New York said "at least 20 houses, but not all 75, will be closed. Bernhard said he had been given information by all exhibitors that the management is uncertain which will be shut down. He estimated 250 persons would be affected by the closing of 20 theatres.

10,000 Employees Affected

Loewen Pizer, president of the Motion Picture Theatre Owners of eastern Pennsylvania, southern New Jersey and Delaware, said about

10,000 employees would be affected by the closing of 20 theatres controlled by members of his organization.

The boycott in the Philadelphia area was instituted about a month ago when Cardinal Dougherty, head of the Catholic archdiocese, issued a letter to the clergy urging that they encourage their parishioners to withhold patronage from the theatres as a method of objecting to indecent and immoral pictures.

Meetings of other denominations followed the cardinal's stand and called upon their members to abstain from attendance. Pledge cards were distributed and signed by church members by their signatures attested their promise to remain away from the theatres.

Schlegel said the closing order was made necessary by the fact that it is cheaper to pay the cost of closed theatres than to operate and maintain even greater losses under the boycott.

Murder - Charged Man Says
He Resented Abuse of

JEFFERSON, Wis., July 5 (AP) (AP) (Thursday)—Sheriff Joseph T. Lange of Jefferson county this morning said he had captured George "Slim" King who had made a full confession to the slaying of Earl B. Gentry, former bodyguard to the leader of Indiana Klansmen. Known about Jefferson as "Slim" King, the slayer, Lange said, told him his name was Carl B. Church, that he was 36 years old and was born in Missouri, Kansas.

"I'm glad I did it and I'd do it again," Lange quoted Church as saying in his confession. "Garry Gili was a wonderful woman and treated me elegantly. I knew Gentry was mistreating her and I killed him as a good deed for the community."

Lange said he had brought Church, named in a warrant issued early today as the slayer, into the jail without trouble at about 12:30 a. m.

Welfare Agency Leaders Invited To White House

WASHINGTON, July 4 (AP)—President Roosevelt has invited representatives of the 34 national welfare agencies to meet at the White House on September 2 to inaugurate their first mobilization for human needs.

Newton D. Baker, chairman of the mobilization, announced today that he had conferred with the president just before his departure for America's territorial outposts and that the president had issued the invitation through him.

Mrs. Roosevelt will serve as chairman of the national women's committee of the mobilization. Last year 215 citizens in 40 states organized women's crusades under Mrs. Roosevelt's direction and the indications now are that an even greater number will be organized this year.

Baker said President Roosevelt had stressed the necessity of the local community, raising community chest funds to care for the needy this year and offered his fullest support to the movement.

The president explained, Baker said, that there was a grave fear that the citizens of the nation would assume that the billions of dollars appropriated by the government for mere-

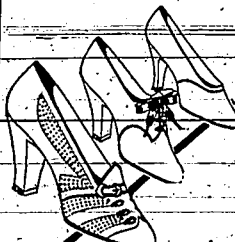

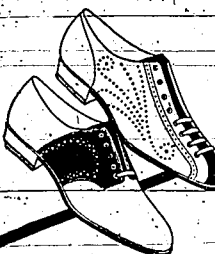
