### RELIEF COMMITTEE APPROPRIATIONS FUNDS

#### Governor Urged to Support Hansen-Murtaugh Road, New PWA Project

Appropriating Twin Falls county's net \$12,500 PWA allotment for July to deputy placement bureau managers in the several communities, Twin Falls county relief committee members—Duncan McD. Johnston, Twin Falls mayor, is chairman, has undertaken to exert control over this county's share of federal relief funds. Hereafter appropriation of the relief funds has been made at the PWA representative manager's office in Twin Falls.

#### Urges Cut-Off Project

Urging this action, Johnston said that some 425 men now employed on PWA projects in this county will be out of work as soon as these projects are completed, and there is no other employment for them. He said the Hansen-Murtaugh cut-off will eliminate death traps at a canal bridge and railroad crossing on the present road. Construction of the cut-off, he said, had been blocked by a four-man committee on a trip to Boise after the project was approved by federal agencies, and within a few days thereafter two persons were fatally injured on the railroad crossing.

The committee chairman on request of the IERA administrator, named a Twin Falls county growth committee, composed of George E. Hart of Buhl, H. E. Morehouse, L. E. Anderson, Paul Bennett and Harry E. Hines.

Striking at IERA deductions from monthly allotments of relief funds to about a \$20,000 overdraft, asserted to have been incurred the first weeks of PWA operations in Idaho, the committee has resolutions addressed to Governor Ross and E. P. Horvath, IERA administrator, urging them to apply to the national administration for funds to cover full amount of this overdraft.

### DEALERS PAVE WAY FOR BEAN HEARING

#### Association Declares for More Money for Producers

In compliance with the request of a growers' committee, members of the Western Bean Dealers Association voted at a meeting here last evening to make formal application for a public hearing on a bean marketing agreement proposed by the agricultural adjustment administration.

The public hearing, according to procedure established by the farm administration, would precede adoption of the marketing agreement.

The requested hearing would be for the Great Northern bean producing district—encompassing southern Idaho and parts of Montana and Wyoming, and the Brunsvick district, which includes the Brunsvick, Idaho and parts of Montana and Wyoming. A similar hearing already has been held in the Michigan district, and others are to be held in New York, Colorado and California bean producing districts.

The bean dealers' resolution authorizing the request for the hearing provided that its president, Charles W. Barlow, of Twin Falls, and Hazelton should be chairman of a committee of five dealers to attend the public hearing in this territory, to cooperate with the officials conducting the hearings and to file all possible objections, securing more money for growers of beans in this territory.

The dealers were requested to apply for the hearing by an expression recorded by the growers' committee in session here Thursday night.

**PRECEDENT RULES**

The matter is not a vital one. The city park has never been used for such purpose and in the past public sentiment has faltered consistently to support any change of procedure.

In this respect, Mr. White agreed to the erection of a temporary standstall but when he discovered that a similar platform was designed to be used to stage the prize fight he ordered it taken down.

Mr. White was acting well within the range of his duties as park commissioner and by refusing to grant permission for the staging of the fight in the park he was merely following a procedure which has obtained ever since the city park was laid out.

A good deal of unnecessary expense might have been saved if the park commissioner had been consulted about the matter in the first place.

**AS COLD WATER TO THIRSTY SOUL**  
(Minneapolis Journal)

Perhaps these words from the Book of Proverbs have never been brought home so forcibly to the people of the northwest as by the welcome rains, breaking such a drought as the oldest inhabitant cannot recall. Was it in the "Hoosier Schism" that the old adage was first used?

There are now 8,000 swimming pools in America and the number is increasing so rapidly that nobody can keep track of it. Swimming has become the supreme national pastime, surpassing golf, bridge, baseball and all the rest.

It is curious when you recall that for many centuries, up to a couple of hundred years ago, people refused to bathe for fear that it would weaken them. Now people bathe to grow healthy. The cleanliness, the air, the sunlight and the exercise all contribute to that end. But most of all, they swim because they want to. They like it. It is one of the finest of sports.

Some day Twin Falls is going to realize just how sadly out of line with modern towns and city development this city has become.

With airports and swimming pools either already provided or now under construction in every lawn in the country worthy of the name the Magic City is able to contribute only objections when either project is brought up for discussion here.

Some day perhaps we will come to our senses or at least enjoy a lucid interval. Certainly the record of the past few years with respect to these two particular projects is not greatly to our credit.

**NEW POSTOFFICES**  
Proposals to depression will soon be under way in about 800 American cities. These will be postoffices, or in more elegant language "federal buildings," to be erected with an emergency appropriation of \$65,000,000 provided by Congress just before adjournment. As many more, to cost about an equal amount, are expected to follow.

Needless to say, most of these structures would not be built in normal times. Nevertheless, as about two-thirds of the communities concerned have no federal buildings, using rented quarters for federal purposes and having average postal receipts of about \$30,000 a year, it is evident that the allotments have some merit. Such "pork" as they involve may be credited largely to federal relief. The program in general, like all building, public and private, may help toward accomplishing the hardest part of the whole recovery program—getting the building industry back to normal activity.

**TO START BUILDING AGAIN**  
The signing of the new housing-bill by the President was followed immediately with a 10 per cent reduction in prices by the National Retail Lumber Dealers' Association. This is good team work, which might be followed patriotically and profitably by other groups of the building materials industry. Such reductions should soon justify themselves, as new construction gained headway, and they would provide much of the initial impetus.

The housing measure supplements other recent acts of Congress aimed at getting into normal action again a big key industry. There is a vast housing shortage and present homes are badly run down. The purpose of this act is to stimulate construction, starting with the modernization of existing houses. The government establishes new machinery for financing. It permits the organization of national mortgage companies, and provides insurance up to twenty per cent of outstanding loans for them or other institutions lending for such construction work. Credit for building new homes is to be provided on an easier plan than any in the past.

General activity in this field would so stimulate dozens of other industries as to
