

FEELING GROWS

As conditions in San Francisco tighten
down it is inevitable that under the stress of down it is inevitable that under the stress of constant irritation feeling will grow more intense. No stalemate lasts forever but dur-ing a period of suspended hostilities the emotional strain increases. This seems to be about the picture of the present situation in San Francisco.

San rranssco.

Food grows steadily scarcer and the business of living in the strike ridden city becomes hourly more difficult. Without gasoline thousands who might leave the area are compelled to remain, thus adding to the gen-eral confusion. Of course there can be but one outcome, namely, a settlement of some sort but whether this will be effected without wholesale bloodshed remains to be seen The right to strike is at all times recog

nized and the further right to prevent other men from taking the strikers' places has al-'men from taking the strikera' places has ai-ways been more or less accepted and out of such acceptance at less a cituation which places the strike as an industrial Wespon in the very first class. But when it comes to interfering with the orderly processes of life in San Francisco or anywhere else, public rights become a part of the picture and the right of either employers or employes to tie up the food supply of thousands who are in no sense parties to the struggle on one side or the other has never been accepted

Eventually a settlement will be reached if only for the reason that the set-up as it now stands will, before very long, fall of its own weight. Employers and employes both must

GERMAN NEWS IN AMERICA Some Nazi sympathizers, in Germany and in America, insist that the general American condemnation of the Hitler regime is based on ignorance—that "Americans don't know

on ignorance—that "Americans don't know
what is going on in Germany."

The fact is that, as far as public affairs
are concerned, the American public is well
informed about the German situation, while
the German people themselves are kept in
ignorance.

The strict censorship in Germany bars
from publication nearly all the islations and

from publication nearly all the intimate and disinterested news that we Americans expect from our own government as a matte from our own gavernment as a matter of course. German newspaper readers learn only what Hitler and his censors want them to know, and get only the official interpretation O. K.'d by what is quaintly called the "Ministry of Enlightenment." But a flood of news comes to American news agencies and papers from their own German correspondents. And for some parallelists. pondents. And for some unexplained reason, Hitler does not apply to those foreign corres-pondents the same strict censorship applied to domestic correspondents.

Americans are deeply interested in Gernan affairs. The result is that probably more truth about the German government reaches us than reaches the Germans themselves, or the people of any other country.

STAGNATION OR IMMIGRATION Speaking of the prospective decline in American population from the decrease in the birth rate, Dr. Oliver M. Baker, econo-mist of the federal Department of Agricul-ture, points out some distressing effects.

"Not only will the demand for farm products decline," he says, "but also the demand for many manufactured com-modities. Vacant houses, vacant store rooms, tidle factories, abandoned farms, will tend to lower rents and interest re-turns, and thereby temporarily lower the cost of living; but the lessened re-

turn to capital is likely to depress grad-ually the spirit of enterprise, and may tend to increasing dependence upon

There is one factor which Dr. Baker and other commentators on this theme are inlined to disregard, and which may yet be clined to disregard, and which may yet be important. They seem to regard the stop-page of immigration as permanent. Most of us do. Nevertheless, that remedy for station-ary or diminishing population will always:

Sooner or later we may decide to tap again the foreign reservoirs of population, new blood, new consuming power, new land hunger and the new business life which might come from them.
