

THE PICTURE CHANGES

An entirely different atmosphere appears to have developed in San Francisco strike circles during the past twenty-four hours and a general feeling of relief has supplanted the nerve wracking hours which followed upon the inauguration of the general

Just what influence is responsible for the change is more or less open to question but it seems apparent that the devastating effect of the movement may have operated to frighten a good many elements into a keener sense of responsibility than obtained when the strike order went into effect. As a demonstration of the extent to which a modern city, is dependent upon transportation the strike may be said to have been a success. But-in-the-process—forces which threatened to bring about a state of which threatened to bring about a sake of affairs upon which the most radical may well have gazed aghast. Carried to a logical con-clusion a general strike in San Francisco

might destroy San Francisco.

In all likelihood the general strike is over and with that feature of the disturbance out of the way it should be possible to see more clearly in the direction of a settlement. Whether or not the original picture has been changed one way or the other by the general strike remains to be seen.

A RAILROAD WITH PROFITS
