(By The Associated Press) The summer's hottest heat wave has caused more than 700 deaths in the last 24 hours, according to the Chicago weather bureau, which reports that the rate of an hour with no relief in sight. WEST COAST STRIKE BLOCKS ROAD WORK

Idaho Oiling Crews Suspend Operations for Lack of Oil

BOISE, July 24 (AP)—J. H. Stiemmer, Idaho director of highways, said yesterday that five Idaho highway oiling crews are out of work because of the longshoremen's strike on the West coast.

"The west coast," Stiemmer, "has tied up the road oil supply as effectively as can be. Even in the eastern end of the state, where supplies come overland from Salt Lake City, companies won't ship anything out of home territory because of the growing uncertainty there."

"As for road oil in the north and west, it's simply out of the question."

"A large share of the oil the state ordered was to have been used in repair and maintenance work," he explained.

The department also had planned to oil 10 miles of the Snake River road in Ada county; 17 miles in Boundary county; 12 miles from Moscow to Troy; 3 1/2 miles south of Moscow to Pullman; 12 miles south of Lewiston to Tammany; 12 miles south from Coeur d'Alene, and several other smaller jobs.

Settlement of the strike recently will not, however, solve the situation in Idaho for some time, Stiemmer said, because the supply has been exhausted.
