GOVERNOR ROSS SPEAKS

One of the points stressed by Governor Ross during his address in Twin Falls last week was that farmers should be willing to pay increased "salaries" to workers in order to bring about increased purchasing power on the part of consumers of farm products.

Wages generally should go up the Gover-nor said, because only by this means can wages stand the strain of the increased prices which mast be paid for farm and agricultural products generally if agriculture is ever

again to become prosperous.

The idea, in theory, is all right, but high wages are less apt to create high prices than high prices are to create higher wages. In words, the Governor has the cart before the horse.

Does this look as though the farmer should be elected to lead the procession back to high-er price levels by paying higher wages? Cer-tainly cattle and hogs will hardly supply the

money for any very heavy wage increase.

And it should be remembered that current prices are not very different to what they have been for four long years. If agricultural prices go up agriculture will be willing enough to pay wages in line with the whole broad cost of living situation. But it is idle to talk of saddling fresh expense upon Idaho farms today. Agriculture is at the bottom of the whole list. Raise the prices of agricultural products and farm wages will take care of themselves.

SURGICAL DISGUISE FOR CRIMINALS

The face of John Dillinger, arch-criminal and No. 1 enemy of society, when he was laid out in the morgue, showed evidence of clever plastic surgery. Scars had been re-placed with smooth skin to prevent identification by the police. His pug nose showed signs of straightening. 
