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### CASTLEFORD PLANS NEW WATER SUPPLY

#### Canal Company Officials Discuss Possibilities Of A Dry Canal

CASTLEFORD, July 31—Water users of Castleford assembled Monday at the Castleford school house to discuss possibilities of drying the municipal well to serve the needs of the village in the case that water is turned out of the Twin Falls Canal company's high line canal during the winter months. The canal is now the municipal water supply source.

The meeting was presided over by C. E. Perkins, director of the Castleford Water Users' association board. W. C. Brown, member of the canal board, addressed the meeting and outlined the requirements needed to acquire assistance in the proposed project. He stated that the nearest well to be sunk or a shaft necessary before the sinking of a shaft.

Possibility of receiving drought relief funds for the sinking of a well was discussed at length. However, members of the canal board suggested the possibility of a well, partially completed by the Ferguson Fruit and Land company during the early days of Castleford might be brought into municipal use. IERRA workers are scheduled to remove all debris from the site of the old well during the next few days.

As soon as the debris is removed an extensive investigation will be made to determine just how much water is in the old well and how much deeper it would have to be sunk to insure a water supply practicable to the use of the village.

W. G. Sloan, canal company engineer, is in Castleford Monday and he stated that a committee would be sent out sometime this week to make further investigation of the proposed project. The canal company officials have already met with Twin Falls and Burley city engineers to discuss the same situation.

### JEROME PLANS NEW TELEPHONE OFFICE

#### Construction to Start on \$17,000-Brick and Terra Cotta Building

JEROME, July 31—Construction work will begin immediately on a new \$17,000 building to house the local offices and switchboard of the Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph company. The new building, local manager of the company announced here today.

The structure will be single story brick with terra cotta trimmings and will be 25 by 48 feet in size, according to plans. #### GRASS SEED RECEIVED BY FOREST SUPERVISOR

BURLEY, July 31—S. S. Stewart, supervisor of the Minidoka forest reserve, has received 6000 pounds of grass seed for sowing in adaptable spots in the reserve. The seed was delivered in bulk at Burley, Idaho, from Ogden, Utah, for distribution to forest headquarters, and was hauled here by truck.

The seed is red top and Canadian blue grass, requiring somewhat damp soil for proper growth, and it is doubted whether these grasses can be handled to good advantage under present drought conditions. It is proposed to sow the seed, if weather conditions change, under regulations of the emergency employment relief administration.

### PIONEER WINNER OF BELLEVUE SUCUMBES

### RESISTANT SEED TO BATTLE WHITE FLY

BURLEY, July 30—Sugar beets are far enough advanced in growth on the Minidoka project to fully demonstrate that resistant seed will materially reduce the effects of white fly ravages, department company officials. Early planted resistant seed, in fields properly cared for, give promise of satisfactory harvests. Non-resistant seed fields are in many cases a complete failure. Only about 20 per cent of resistant seed was planted, the reason given being the report issued by government leaf hopper investigators that the present season would likely be free from serious infestation.

Whether there will be sufficient tonnage on the Minidoka project to justify the operation of the Burley sugar factory this fall, remains undetermined. It seems possible that either the product of the Minidoka project may be shipped to Ogden, Utah, or that the Ogden tonnage may prove so light that beets harvested in that district may be shipped here for processing in the Burley factory. It appears certain that beets harvested in neither one of these districts will be sufficient to justify the operation of a factory without outside shipments.

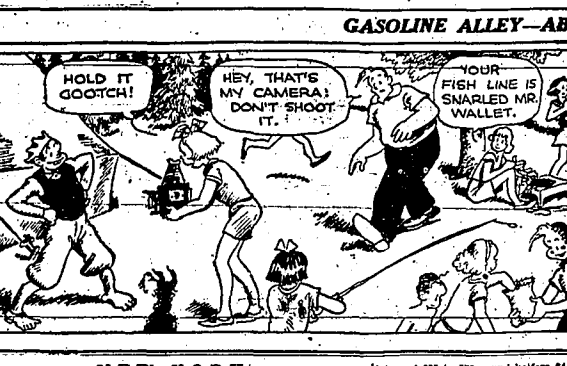

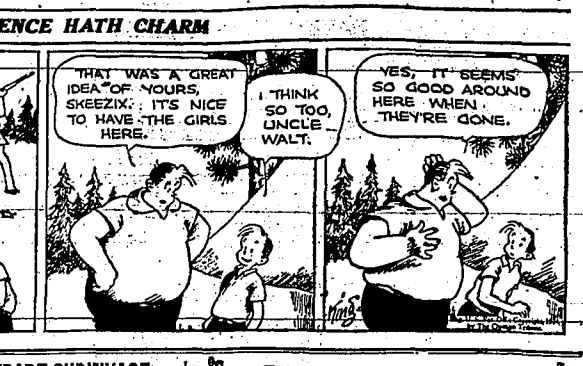
