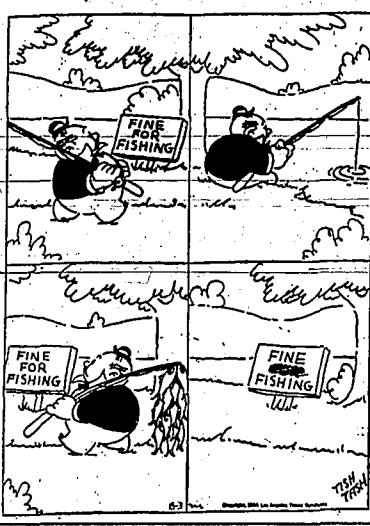

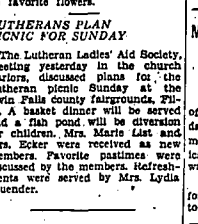

Oregon Expedition Seeks Evidence of Pre-Historic Man

—JEROME, Ore., Aug. 2 (AP)—An expedition left here yesterday for isolated Grouse valley of southeastern Oregon to seek traces of pre-historic man.

Scientists from Stanford university and University of Oregon were in the expedition headed by Dr. L. S. Crossman, University of Oregon anthropologist and authority on aboriginals of northwestern America. Dr. Crossman is well-known in this section for his discoveries.

The region to be studied by the party was first brought to light by Marie Jacobs of the geological survey, who found traces of ancient Indian habitations in a remote basin not far from the California line.

Dr. Crossman visited the area and discovered on basaltic cliffs, overlooking a depression which once held a lake, writings, cut into rocks and filled with pigments. Dr. Crossman was confident the writings represented penetration of aboriginals from the Southwest, probably centuries ago.

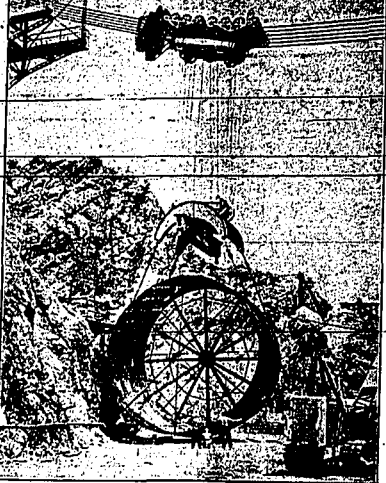

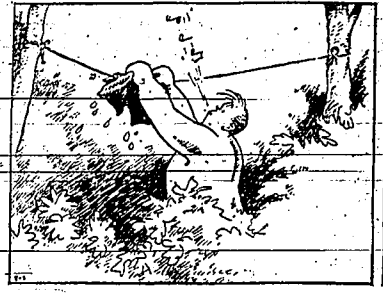

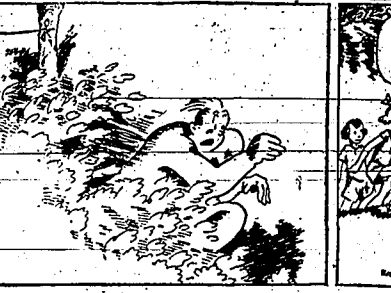
