CHAPMAN CHARGES IRREGULARITIES IN GOVERNOR'S OFFICE

Twin Falls Man Calling for Democratic House- Cleaning, Assails Ross Administration's Record

Calling upon Idaho Democrats to "clean our own house and put it in order or the people will clean it entirely for us," W. Orr Chapman, Twin Falls attorney and candidate two years ago for the Democratic nomination for United States senator, addressing a public meeting in the Legion memorial building here last evening, assailed Governor C. Ben Ross on his record and declared "he is unfit to be re-nominated, particularly re-nomination for a third term."

Explaining that he spoke as a "private in the ranks of Democracy" with the purpose to "assist in the selection of a proper leader for my party," Chapman assailed the "recognition and personality and qualifications" of Frank Martin of Boise, who he termed "the only candidate who has opposed and is opposing Governor Ross in this primary."

Ross Mayor Candidate

He urged nomination and reelection of T. Dan Connor of Pocatello as state senator in opposition to the candidacy of Duncan McPherson, Twin Falls mayor who administration as mayor, he said, had flooded the city with turmoil and a flood of accusations as to his motives and who he regarded as "a good Republican as long as the Republican party retained any vestige of power and who doubtless will be a Democrat only so long as the Democratic party retains power."

He endorsed the candidacy for reelection of F. Foster, Twin Falls county sheriff, who, he said, is "faithful, honest and efficient," and one who "does not have the winking habit but is able to keep both eyes open."

Machine Still Unpalatable

Asserting that Governor Ross has made a record of "extraneous, inefficient, infamous cabinet form of government... even at the price of violating his oft-repeated promise to clean up the platform pledge of his party," Chapman declared: "The fact that a machine is operated by a political boss pretending to be a Democrat does not render the machine any more attractive or palatable than when it is Republican."

Dealing with Governor Ross' claims of reduction in the cost of state government, Chapman charged the governor has "made no effort to perform" his pledge to reduce costs by abolition of needless activities and unnecessary offices. Continuing he said: "He says he has reduced appropriations, and to an impressive degree he has, by tapping new sources of revenue by way of license fees, kilowatt and income taxes. Nevertheless the cost of state government is not reduced, it does not relieve the taxpayer to take a little less out of his right pocket by reaching into his left pocket to more than make up the difference."

Charges Irregularities

Pointing out that under the cabinet form the governor is charged with every department of state government, Chapman charged irregularities in respect to cost and payment of highway construction, and concentration of purchases made by the state highway department "into a very few hands."

"I make the charge, and make it advisedly, and with ability to prove it," he asserted, "that irregularities have occurred in the highway department with respect to the cost

and payment for highway construction, which have been brought to the attention of the governor, and have received no attention from him. Recently a stretch of highway was improved between Boise and Mountain Home. The rock work was sub-contracted, and the sub-contractors were paid by the contractors for all the rock work actually done. The state of Idaho, however, paid for just a trifle less than twice the amount of rock work actually done on the job. This was brought to the attention of the governor, and he said it could not have happened. He made no investigation, although it was made to appear to him that the state had, for some reason, paid out several thousand dollars for which it did not receive value."

Relief Work Perverted

On other counts, Chapman assailed Ross' record as a member of the board of pardons and in connection with federal relief activities. "That the governor did attempt to mislead and pervert the CWA into a political machine is shamefully true," he said. "Every person employed. I am informed, in the CWA was advised that it was on the recommendation of Governor Ross, and not advised as to whether those who were charged or laid off and cut out of work were advised that too had been done on the recommendation of Governor Ross."

"I have been informed in numerous places," Chapman continued, "that word has gone out to persons receiving federal relief, or engaged in federal relief work, or employed in the CCC camps throughout the state, that unless they vote for Ross they will lose their jobs, and in this country, I am informed, that in addition to voting for Ross they must vote for Dunc Johnson for state senator, or they will lose their jobs. I want to say to persons so situated that they are not receiving this relief, nor their employment, by or through Ben Ross or Dunc Johnson, or either of them. This relief and this work they owe to the genius and humanitarianism of Franklin D. Roosevelt. They vote a secret ballot and they cannot be coerced."

HITLER IS NOW SUPREMA. With the death of Hindenburg the goal of his ambition is reached. As President of the Reich he controls the army and appoints the Chancellor.

It was only President Hindenburg, with his constitutional authority and his command of the Reichswehr, that prevented Hitler from turning into a complete autocrat before this.

The legal succession to the Presidency, in case of such a vacancy as that caused by Hindenburg's death, is to the head of the Supreme Court. But what is a constitutional hindrance under the bent cross, with Father Hindenburg gone?

That is, while he is upheld by military authority and maintains the power of life and death, The Reichswehr leaders have the key to the situation. After them, the Brown Shirts. For the present, Hitler sits on the lid, supreme as a Caesar or a Czar.

NIGHT CLUB SONG-FESTS The nifty night clubs are going in now for old-fashioned song-fests. This development comes just at a time when proprietors were at their wits' end to find some fresh novelty for blasé patrons.

They say it's really surprising, when a common citizen sneaks guiltily into one of those gilded dens, to find somebody hanging the piano like a college boy at a fraternity meeting night, and people at all the tables roaring at such fine old masterpieces as "Two Little Girls in Blue" and "Sweet Adeline."

NO MORE ARMS FOR BOHIVIA Secretary of State Hull decided that arms and ammunition ordered by the Bolivian government before our government declared its embargo on such shipments might still be delivered.

The resolution adopted by the United States government conceding permission to the Bolivian government for embarking an important quantity of war material after having decreed an embargo on arms caused a painful surprise in Paraguay.

Many Americans are pained by it. The pain is general through Pan-America. And probably Secretary Hull himself is pained as much as anybody. The Secretary seems to have been caught between the devil and the deep sea. Quite aside from the question of consistency, as a pacifist he could hardly have wanted to add any more gunpowder to the flames of war in the Gran Chaco.

Really, there should be a better way out of such dilemmas. The best way of all would be to stop the private arms industry altogether.

 WASHINGTON, (AP)—The ramblingest family ever to cross patois in the White House—these Roosevelts!

Yet the more widely they scatter, the more closely knit they become. Each trip, singly or in groups, is a family experience, for the entertainment of all.

As their top-notch mileage amasser, Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, once expressed it: "It's the fun of the trip is the silly little things you bring back to other people."

The Roosevelt trails have crisscrossed the continent; dotted the island possessions; traversed the oceans—all in less than a year and a half.

The eldest among them, Mrs. James Roosevelt, even now is dashing about Europe, visiting the British king and queen and hobnobbing with scores of other notables, at the age of eighty years. At that, the president's mother is only paying back the visit her older sister, Mrs. Delano Forbes, of Paris, made her last Christmas.

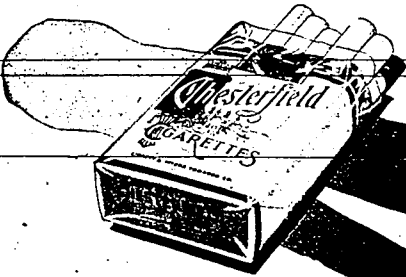

In behalf of the taxpayers and as an economy measure, Connor supported a bill passed by the last legislature under which Twin Falls county was one of 15 counties reduced in classification. Under this law, salaries of county commissioners, who in this county have no responsibility for roads and bridges, were reduced from \$1500 to \$900 a year.

For 10 years until 1929, Twin Falls county was a county of the Second class. There has been no change in the law which the attorney general recently held permits commissioners to pay county bills each month if they see fit to do so.

Connor was told by his colleagues in the senate that his effort for a state-wide pension law would fail because most counties are ignoring the present law or paying only a small amount under its provisions.

John Citizen Now Buys New Roof on Installation Plan

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9 (AP)—George Jones now can get a new roof on his home in much the same way he buys a car or radio on the installment plan.

This is the way he goes about it under laws and regulations issued today by the federal housing administration.

Based on credit estimate from his banker or architect, Jones goes to a bank or another lending agency cooperating in the administration of the federal credit program.

Jones can hire a contractor or purchase the supplies and do the work himself.

If he prefers, Jones can take his credit statement to a contractor or supply dealer, who obtains credit approval from a financial institution.

The contractor puts on the new roof and upon completion of the job returns the bill to the bank.

Jones can make monthly payments on the loan over a period as long as three years. Unless it is required by state law, the financing is not subject to demand.

Jones could obtain a single loan for as much as \$2000, but his annual income would have to be at least five times as much as the amount he would pay on his note in a year.

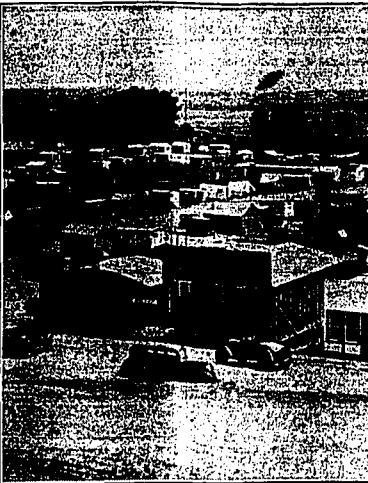

STREET PROJECTS OPEN AT KIMBERLY

Highway District and State Aid Village in Getting Improvements

KIMBERLY, Aug. 9.—With the cooperation of the state highway district, the state bureau of public instruction, and the village of Kimberly, two street projects are now under way here.

The east and west road joining U. S. highway 30 and Main street is being resurfaced with gravel and oil. Completion of this road was expected last Friday. In order to prevent tourists and local traffic from detouring highways, the highway has been operated by working on only one side of the road at a time thus giving all traffic available room to travel.

SUPREME COURT RULES ON INTEREST RATES

BOISE, Aug. 9 (AP)—The supreme court today affirmed a decision of the Ada county district court setting the rate to be paid by banks on the public deposits at approximately one-half of one per cent.

The decision was an interpretation of the law enacted by the last legislature. The interest rate on the average paid on bank balances by the Portland and Salt Lake clearing houses. The legislature intended a reduction from the former rate of two per cent, but when the national bank act abolished interest on demand bank balances, the interest suddenly dropped to zero. 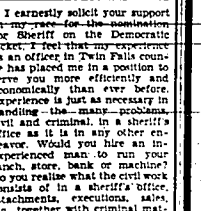
