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15,000 ALUMINUM WORKERS' COUNCIL CALLS FOR STRIKE

National Labor Relations Board at Washington Announces Readiness to Strive for Agreement

(By The Associated Press) The aluminum workers' council called a strike effective midnight Friday at all plants of the Aluminum Company of America, to climax weeks of futile efforts to reach agreement.

The national labor relations board in Washington announced it was standing by willing to assist in arranging a settlement of the strike which involves 15,000 employees.

The board's decision was announced by a statement which said the board would check up on the company's operations the same way in all company plants.

Meanwhile, in Minneapolis the 25-day old truckers strike was still unsettled, but 3000 employees have agreed to return to work.

The employers' advisory committee in St. Louis gave formal consent for elections among workers to determine their desires regarding the strike.

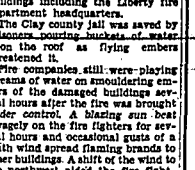

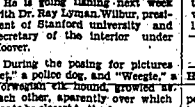

### CASSIA BIRDS FOR PRIMARY ELECTION

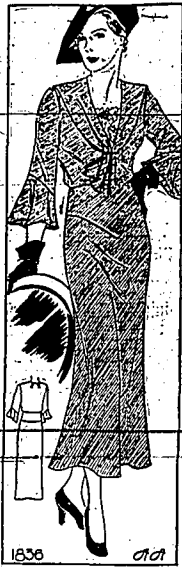
#### Contests on Both Tickets on Slate; Large Vote Anticipated

#### Guiding Your Child

The Essential Step  
When Dora was three years old she began to object to her daily nap. For nearly a year her mother carried on an unequal struggle with the child, and then gave up. Justifying her surrender with the statement that Dora would probably sleep better at night.  
But Dora did not sleep better. Instead she was so nervously exhausted by bed-time that she could not get to sleep for hours, and then woke up frequently with nightmares.  
No child of six or under can stand 14 or even 12 hours of unbroken activity. Children who do so go physically or mentally every minute of the day, and especially very little children who are subjected to a new and strange. They certainly need rest, and if possible sleep to break the long-continued strain.  
No one, whether child or adult, can sleep at night if he is over-tired, and the little child, who with his limited physical and mental equipment is working doubly hard in the effort to keep pace with the giants about him, is bound to be over-tired after a long day.  
Most children who have been trained from earliest babyhood to take a nap for hours as part of the day's program, and who have never dreamed of an alternative, never question the habit, but sleep automatically when the appointed hour comes. It is best to fix a necessary rest period from the start, a new game has been started, or been planned. The minute the meal is finished the child should be laid at rest partly undressed and laid down in a cool and darkened room.  
If the mother can manage to do this for a while, she will find there is an atmosphere of fear and anger about the house, the child will find it easier to sleep and the benefits to both mother and child are incalculable.

IRRIGATION VS. DROUGHT

From such sources the money is taken. If taxes are all paid and the smaller sources deliver as estimated, there might be such surplus as the auditor suggests that showing heavy delinquencies in property taxes, etc. But the estimate has incredible optimism. It has a strong suspicion that there is no cash in the state treasury but that interest bearing warrants are being issued right now to pay current bills.

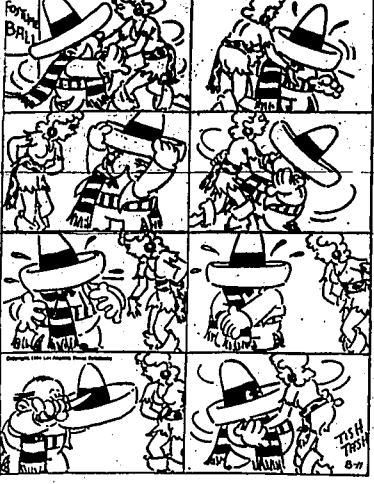
