TREASURY REVIEWS PLEDGE TO LIMIT SILVER AS MONEY

Morgenthau Makes Public President's Letters in Continuing Effort to Allay Talk of Inflation (WASHINGTON, Aug. 13) - A continuation, apparently, of treasury efforts to allay inflation fears over recent months was today announced by Secretary Morgenthau.

The silver purchase act was signed June 14. This announcement, and an answer by the secretary related to an announcement already made by the treasury that under present plans continuation of a million dollars plus of currency expansion would follow.

The secretary also disclosed that the treasury bought government bonds totaling \$45,000,000 last week and that it also acquired \$22,000,000 worth of U. S. Treasury Notes.

COMMITTEE'S VOTE OF CENSURE OKAYED

Democratic Chairman Cites Endorsers When Chapman Questions Action

A resolution assertedly adopted by the executive committee of Twin Falls county Democratic central committee, denouncing W. Orr Chapman, Twin Falls, and his committee in a public address against the state administration, has been endorsed by 15 of the county committee's members.

Chapman's statement was as follows: "The executive committee of the Democratic central committee of Twin Falls county, as appears from its letterhead, is composed of seven members, as follows:

Asher B. Wilson, Lee Leichter, R. E. Morehouse, Harold A. Yonemans, E. A. Landon, L. J. Malone, C. M. Wiseman.

Four of these members informed me that they were not present at any meeting of the executive committee on Saturday, August 11, and three of them did not have any knowledge of, and none of them concurred in the resolution purported to have been adopted by that committee. This leaves Asher B. Wilson, Lee Leichter and R. E. Morehouse as the only members of the committee who could have been present.

Mr. Wilson is an appointee of Governor Ross; likewise Mr. Leichter is an appointee of Governor Ross, and Mr. Morehouse is employed by the FEPA. The Democratic county chairman, Mr. Dan Cavanaugh, I presume is an ex-officio member of this committee, having appointed it. He is also the contractor who is closely identified politically with Asher B. Wilson. He has been awarded numerous road and bridge contracts from the present state administration, and as a member of the FEPA under appointment of Governor Ross. These are the people who make denial on behalf of Governor Ross of the charge contained in my speech, and who have attempted to read me out of the Democratic party for having mentioned this matter. It is significant that Governor Ross has his committee and every committeeman in the list volunteered their endorsement, and an effort to contact the rest of the committee would probably result in a unanimous endorsement. The executive committee is appointed by the chairman and chairman is understood as who constitutes this committee. He falsely accused Asher B. Wilson, who is not a member of the executive committee, of subscribing to the resolution.

The undersigned, being duly qualified members of the Twin Falls county Democratic central committee, hereby subscribe to and approve of the action of the executive committee taken on August 11 last. In regard to resolution concerning W. Orr Chapman for an attack on the state administration and charging irregularities.
