

PRIMARIES

Primary elections throughout Idaho today bring to the voters of the state a moment of decision—at once a challenge and an oppor-

Primary elections, set up under Idaho law place upon the state's citizenship as a whole the direct responsibility for selection of can-didates for public office. They bring the citi-zen into close contact with the machinery of politics. They involve a duty as well as a privilege.

During the past several weeks citizens have had opportunity to study and compare the claims and qualifications of rival candidates for nominations, all leading to the verthat are to be recorded by the voters

The whole theory of the primary election is that the citizenship as a whole is well able to make a wise and intelligent selection among the several candidates.

The argument for primary elections as well as the fate of candidates is at stake in every primary election.

FRONTIERS

Stanley Baldwin calmly tells the British parliament, and through it the British people, that Reitain's military frontier is no longer the "white cliffs of Albion" but the river Rhine. So he and the rest of the British cabinct are pushing a new program of air de-fense. If any menace has to be met at the Rhine. Britain will be there to meet it with scouting and bombing planes. There will be a great, new air fleet built. Such a fleet may meet a potential enemy before he starts. It will not have to be hidden away for its own protection, as the Great British naval fleet vas in the latter part of the World War-in n chained harbor, under bomb-proof steel

Italy is expanding her air force along with her naval force, spending 1,200,000,000 lire on aircraft and only 254,000,000 on warships. Mussolini, like Baldwin, sees the need of pushing out his defensive frontiers and building his first line of defense in the air.

The preparations made by France in this line are well known. Underground and overhead, her defences are the last word,

America has no such immediate problem of defense as these European powers have, but needs to be on guard, strengthening her defenses and pushing them outward as long as the world remains so uncertain as it is These European examples cannot be lost on Washington, regardless of the dominance of "ground generals." America, too, will have its air defenses.

NEWSPAPERS AND LEISURE

Either the new leisure, so much talked about these days, is a great boon to the newspapers or the newspapers are a great boon to the newly-leisured. When 4,000 out of 5,000 persons questioned reply that reading the newspapers is their favorite leisure-time

Considering the oft-reiterated statement that "you can't believe anything you read in the papers." the popularity of the daily newspaper may be surprising, but it is real. People have been heard to say in the last year or two that newspapers are more interesting than ever. They are, Partly that is because the news is more exciting and unpredictable.
World affairs have fascinated us ever since the World War. But that is not all. There are more and better features in the news-papers, and they cover a wide range of in-terests, from comics and sports to popular articles on such highbrow subjects as science, ousic and art.

Some people read everything in the paper—even the editorials. Others concentrate on a few special interests and skim the rest. The number not reading at least on paper daily is astonishingly small.

RIOTOUS MUSIC APPRECIATION

They like music in Buenos Aires, particu-larly violin music played by Mischa Elman. An enthusiastic audience nearly rioted in that city recently when he gave a concert.

The audience cheered and shouted. The

musician responded generously with 12 encores. During the performance he played a new composition of his own, "Tango." That was the climax for his listeners. They demanded it again, but Elman, who makes it practice never to repeat anything he has just played, refused.

An endurance contest followed.

Finally the lights of the concert hall were

extinguished. Mischa Elman went to his dressing room. But the crowd was right on his heels. They clamored for the piece again, and at last the violinist yielded, to the com-plete delight of those who had insisted.

Outside the hall Elman found his admirers still waiting. Nearly the entire audience, it is reported, stood in the street cheering him. The crowd then marched to the railroad station to bid him good-by, still cheering.

Rural schools are in dire need and they

It is not good strategy, however, to counte pleas It is not good strategy, however, to couple pleas for financial add with demnads for the creation of a federal department of education, with cabinet rank and an immediate federal grant or \$500,000,000. It is a highly controversial subject and many of the ablest educators have already gone on record as being op-posed to handing over education to the national gov-ernment. It would inevitably mean the creation of a new bridge of clicabelders.

JULY FARM PRICES (Portland Oregonian)

Average prices received by farmers of the United stee for farm products on data available on July 15 stood at eighty per cent of the five-year average for 1909-1914 and of the July average for the same period. Nearly all products showed higher price level than those of a rear ago. One might think on the surface that the farmers are on their way out of their troubles, but in reality they are not in an strong a position as they were a year ago. The reason is to be found in the heightened costs of their materials. With the five-year basic purchase price index at 100, the farmers are now paying 122. On July 15, 1933, the index atood at 107.


