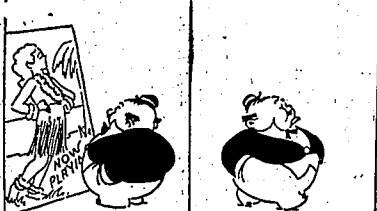

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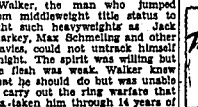
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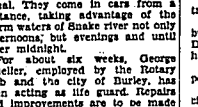

Erickson of Twin Falls for secretary of state; Roy Overhulse of Welpe for state treasurer; George A. August of Idaho Falls for state auditor; George Eilber of Buhl for state superintendent of public instruction; George Dawson of Boise for mines inspector.

D. P. Donahue of Pocatello, socialist state secretary, was nominated at a district convention following a resolution to be party platform for the second district congressman.

The socialist state platform, previously submitted to the party's membership in a mail referendum, was adopted by the convention without discussion.

Urging repeal of Idaho's primary election law, the convention proposed to be "independent" socialists do not have to wait for 61 percent of the voting strength to bring about a change in Idaho's primary law, but that this goal may be attained by exercise of economic power. He found examples of economic power in economic organizations such as industrial, labor and farm unions, and referred to the San Francisco general strike as a demonstration of the strength of organized labor power."
