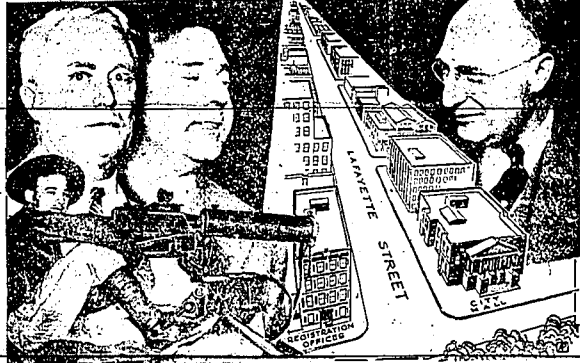

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Hale Leads Dworshak By Narrow Margin For Congressional News

Close Race Between Republicans For Nomination For Representative; Other Places Settled

(By The Associated Press) BOISE, Aug. 15.—With most other party places definitely settled by the primary of yesterday, a close race continued today between two Republican aspirants for Second district congressional honors but it appeared nearing a conclusion.

A tabulation of what observers believe is fully 85 per cent of the vote failed to bring a certain determination of the issue, although Homer G. Hale, leader of Latter Day Saints church activities in Boise, continued to be the principal opponent, Henry C. Dworshak of Burley, newspaper publisher, by a narrow margin.

Securely nominated among the Democrats were C. Ben Ross, seeking his third term as governor; D. Worth Clark in the Second congressional district, and Rep. Compton I. White in the First district.

Also nominated among the Republicans are Burton L. French in the Second district, where he was unopposed, and Frank L. Stephens for governor.

Comparative Voting A tabulation of 854 of the state's 830 precincts brought in 7,071 votes, which compared with approximately 85,000 votes cast in the last primary election two years ago. Outstanding candidates included small, and several counting judges who were placed padlocks on their ballots preparatory to turning them over to the county commission.

The Democratic choice in Nebraska was Representative E. R. Burke, enthusiastic Roosevelt follower. He is opposed by Robert G. Simmons, former representative, who takes the emphatic stand that the president is leading in the wrong direction.

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NAVY GETS BIDS ON 13 WARSHIPS

Builders' Proposals Show Sharp Increase in Anticipated Costs

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15 (AP)—Another big step toward a full treaty strength fleet was taken today when the navy department received bids for the construction of 12 warships from 13 shipbuilding companies.

Twelve more vessels in the new construction program are to be built in navy yards but the awards are not final until the fall. Bids, opened today by Secretary Swanwick in the presence of the high contracting board, showed a sharp increase in the anticipated costs due to higher labor and material costs. The total cost for the program expected to be around \$50,000,000 would be jumped to between \$60,000,000 and \$70,000,000.

Contract awards are to be made in about two weeks after the bids have been studied. The program calls for one 10,000-ton light cruiser, the keel of which cannot be laid down until January 1935, under the London arms conference agreement, a 10,000-ton six inch gun cruiser, two destroyer leaders, two destroyers and three submarines.

Bill Shorter 78 Vessels
"Committee of the navy in the current building program will leave the navy still shy of 78 vessels of an aggregate tonnage of 120,075 of the London arm treaty limit."

High navy officials privately expressed the view that the construction authorized in the program would place the United States in an improved position in the event of the projected naval arms conference. Besides the 24 ships in the present program, the navy has 43 craft either under construction or contract.

NAVY GETS BIDS ON 13 WARSHIPS

Builders' Proposals Show Sharp Increase in Anticipated Costs

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15 (AP)—Another big step toward a full strength fleet was taken today when the navy department received bids for the construction of 13 warships from 13 shipbuilding companies.

Twelve more vessels in the new construction program are to be built in navy yards but the awards are not to be made until the fall.

The program was announced by Secretary Swanson in the presence of the high commanding admirals, showed a sharp increase in the anticipated costs due to the increase in material costs. Indications were the total cost for the program expected to be around \$30,000,000 would be distributed to between \$500,000,000 and \$55,000,000.

Contract awards are to be made in the next few weeks after the bids received have been studied. The program calls for one 10,000-ton eight inch gun cruiser, one of which cannot be laid down until January 1, 1935, under the London arms conference agreement, a 10,000-ton eight inch cruiser, two destroyers and four, five destroyers and three submarines.

Still Short 74 Vessels
Completion of the 24 ships in the current building program will leave the navy still shy of 78 vessels of the aggregate tonnage of 104,775 of the London navy treaty limit.

High navy officials privately expressed the view that the construction program authorized and planned would place the United States in an improved position in the event of a possible future arms conference is called. Besides the 24 ships in the present program, the navy has 43 craft under construction on contract.

All bids submitted alternate proposals based on whether labor was to remain stationary, and if the government would reimburse them for advances in labor and material costs.

Officials said that in order to spread employment and the benefits of the construction program it was possible that contracts for the destroyers would be awarded to individual companies. This would place some of the next low bidders in line for awards.

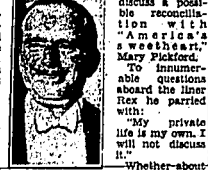

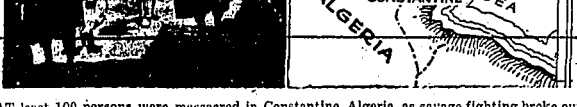

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EQUALIZATION BOARD SEEKS NEW FORMULA

Threat of Contest Sult by Railroads Hangs Over Session

BOISE, Aug. 14 (AP) — The state board of equalization today began preparation of a system of assessing equalization of property values in Idaho for tax purposes without bringing on the threat of a contest suit by the railroads.

Members of the board met in the office of Governor Ross, chairman, to discuss a method of procedure in hearing the utility officials and two county assessors who annually swear for the 14 day session.

Last year most railroad valuations were in the power utilities, in several instances, received increased assessments.

The board at that time adopted a formula based on several methods of assessing value of property for tax purposes and a suit threatened by several railroad representatives at the meeting did not materialize. Several railroad men said a formula should be adopted which would replace the "rule of thumb" method they insisted had caused them to be assessed too high.

Several railroad men, however, are not satisfied with the present method being used by members of the board, but Governor Ross said several variations in railroad valuations as to valuations, as well as inquiring into railroads and utility valuations, might be adopted.

NORTHPORK, Cal., Aug. 15 (AP) — The bodies of Mr. and Mrs. Conrad Rittenbacher, amateur mountain climbers, were found crushed and broken below a glacier-scarred peak of the high Sierra today, a wireless message received here from a searching party said.

The message received at headquarters of the Sierra national forest said the couple, who disappeared more than a week ago had apparently fallen from Mt. Banner, a sharp peak of the wild Minarets country.

Mrs. Rittenbacher's body was found on a glacier ledge 600 feet from the top of the frowning peak. Her husband, the message said, had apparently fallen with her, struck the ledge and then rolled 800 feet further down the glacier.

The Rittenbachers were from San Mateo, California.
