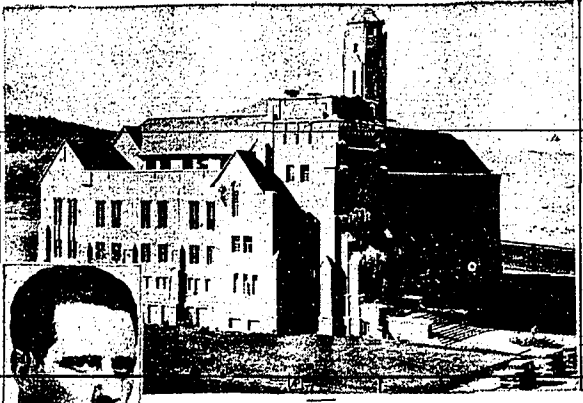

COUNTY REDUCES WHEAT PRODUCTION

Local Committee Chairman Figures Crop 44 Per Cent Under 1933

Twin Falls county's 1934 wheat crop will approximate 44 per cent less than the production of wheat last year, H. C. Lauterbach of Hansen, chairman of the Twin Falls county wheat production control committee, announced last evening.

The reduction includes the Salmon River project's crop which is practically a total failure because of water shortage this season.

The local committee's figures on reduction of the wheat crop are to be reviewed by an AAA inspector who is expected to arrive here Saturday, and payment of the remainder of the 1934 wheat reduction benefit is expected to follow shortly.

The committee chairman there seems to be an idea, which is erroneous, that there has been no reduction of Twin Falls county's wheat production control committee under the federal government's crop reduction program.

In five hours of routing dealings, only 27,440 shares changed hands on the "big board," the lowest since July 5, 1922. With a much smaller list of shares to trade in them, the exchanges recorded a volume of 27,000 shares. Some movements were mixed but continued toward slightly lower levels. The Standard Statistics company average for 90 stocks sagged 0.04 points to 102.20. Commodities diverted attention from stocks as grains and cotton advanced in price. Cotton continued to soar. Hogs in Chicago moved to a new top at \$6.85 a hundred, the highest since September, 1931. The Moody index of spot commodity prices reached a new 1934 peak of 105.75, compared to 102.24 last Friday.

Inaction ruled in bonds as well as stocks and a recovery movement, particularly in the U. S. treasury issues were somewhat reactionary.

Wheat reacted before close and finally only 1/4 of a cent advanced. Other cereals were mixed, with only rye sending its advance more than 2 cents. A late upturn left cotton 2c to a 1/2c higher at net. Sugar advanced 1/2c. Declaration of an extra dividend of 50 cents a share by Dupont and 25 cents a share by General Electric. Manhattan Transit failed to ripple the call surface of the stock market.

The dollar was firm in foreign exchange dealings. It advanced in liquidation in steel shares was prompted by the American Iron and Steel Institute's offer of 21.3 per cent of capacity by August 23 per cent a week ago, the lowest of the year, and comments of steel observers that the industry is in steel buying was expected.

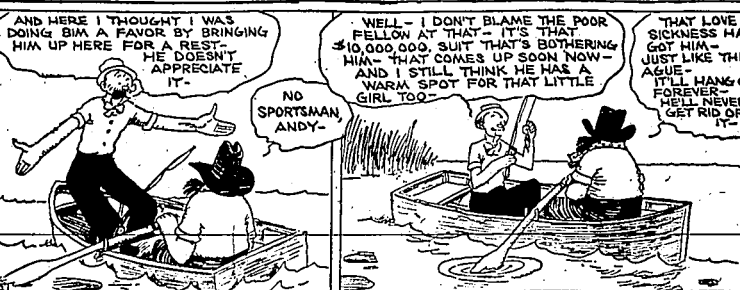

RELIEF EMPLOYEES SEEK MORE FUNDS

IERA Workers Take Lead in Move to Double State's \$250,000 Allotment

Disappointed in their efforts the past several months to obtain by means of resolutions and appeals addressed to Idaho's governor and the IERA administrator, an increased federal allotment for relief and direct relief, IERA workers in Twin Falls have started petitioning to be multiplied throughout the state.

They also appealed to President Roosevelt and H. L. Hopkins, FEPA administrator, M. L. Smith, spokesman for the workers here, announced last evening.

The petitions are to be started at a public meeting called to be held in Twin Falls city park next Wednesday evening.

Petitioners will request doubling of Idaho's \$250,000 IERA allotment, and that work relief and direct relief be segregated from "emergency" necessary for carrying on operations under drought relief or other purposes.

Organizers of the petition movement declared that a \$500,000 monthly FEPA allotment for Idaho is necessary for the reason that conditions already had because of insufficient employment, are getting worse.

"There is very little outside work, and many are half starved for lack of sufficient nourishing food and nearly all lack money with which to pay rent," they say.

"The assistance, continued and enthusiastic work has made possible the health camps," Mrs. Athey said. "A detailed report will be made by the camp committee very soon, but I should like to express my appreciation to all the agencies which have contributed to the success of the camp."

"Without the donations of food and extra money and the labor assigned by the IERA, we could not have served such a large group of children this year, because of the difficult financial problems. We are especially grateful to Joe Koehler who has raised \$120 through Pal's Night to aid the cost of material for the dining unit."

"Through the operation of health camps in Twin Falls and Kootenai counties, more than 1000 children will be sent back to school in better health, according to Mrs. Athey.
