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U. S. AGENT LAUDS FARM COOPERATIVE

Senator Borah, Governor Ross guests at Caldwell picnic

CALDWELL, Idaho, Aug. 24 (AP)—F. W. Peck, cooperative bank commissioner from Washington, D. C., told 10,000 dairymen and their families gathered here for a picnic today that cooperative enterprises had helped more than 100,000 farmers.

He was the principal speaker at the picnic sponsored by the Cooperative Creamery of Boise and the Agricultural Experiment Station. Present at the picnic were Senator Borah and Governor Ross, but only the latter of the two spoke.

"I guess I'm a Democrat," the youth replied.

"Well, then," commented the governor, "you have a chance to be president."

Not "Care All"

Peck warned the dairymen that the cooperative movement is not a "care all" for farm problems but "agriculture, even in its present stage of cooperation, goes far more than the measure on the right-hand side of the balance sheet because of the existence of cooperative enterprises."

Advancement of credit for production or distribution of lowering interest rates are the two main problems, Peck said, but directed that final solution lies "directly in the hands of the farmer and his cooperative."

"Although the government may assist rural people, the fundamental solution of the cooperative will not come by government edict, government credit or government control. It will come only through the farmers' cooperative efforts."

BUHL CHAMBER BACKS HIGHWAY ASSOCIATION

BUHL, Aug. 24—Buhl Chamber of Commerce on its regular meeting at the Royal cafe Monday noon with the president, Stanley A. Weber, presiding.

As a result of a meeting held at the First National bank here Friday evening, all members of the Buhl Chamber of Commerce and W. G. Scott, Los Angeles, who is associated with the Inland Highway association, and members of the local chamber of commerce were present. A committee consisting of J. H. Barker, C. M. Merriam, J. H. Winkler, were appointed to have charge of matters pertaining to the U. S. 92 highway which is to run from Canada to Los Angeles and to the southern point of California.

As the luncheon meeting Monday a resolution was passed stipulating that "Whereas, it appears to the directors of the Buhl Chamber of Commerce that it would be advantageous to this community to sponsor the program as outlined by the Inland Highway association for the improvement of U. S. Highway 92 and the building of a highway from Crescent City, California, easterly through this community, now be it resolved: That the board of directors of the Buhl Chamber of Commerce sponsor said program as outlined and do everything possible to further said program to completion. The committee appointed was directed to associate and cooperate with the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce in regard to the highway.

As a result of communications between the local chamber of commerce and Roy J. Lyman of the geologic survey, regarding the surveying of the Brunau tract, Lyman was in Buhl Monday and reported that a survey had been made from Murphy to Three Creek to Brunau by federal aid and that the state had done surveying work from Thousand Springs to Brunau, Elko through Brunau to Mountain Home. He said that a four-foot monument had been placed every five miles, three feet under ground and that a 30-foot concrete monument with 50 to 60-foot bottom had been placed, going from Brunau to Redburg. Two miles of work has been done on the line running from Thousand Springs to Brunau, following a double line of the Idaho Power company with monuments five feet south of poles.

Director Roy C. Felt announced that it would be about another month before the city reservoir would be completed.

Silver Certificate Circulation Limited

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24 (AP)—The treasury revealed last night that less than 100,000 silver certificates are in circulation.

The remainder, after making allowances for whatever amounts may be in the hands of the public, are held by the Federal Reserve system.

The amount is disclosed by a comparison of Treasury and Federal Reserve figures, showing a net increase of \$1,500,000 in money in circulation since the silver plan was inaugurated, with a jump in Federal Reserve notes outstanding amounting for \$2,414,000 of that total.

Redmond has played on something like 1700 courses around the world, yet you'd have to be as tricky in your guesswork as he is with his nibble to name his favorite layout of all.

St. Andrew's Carmichael's Brookline? Olympia Field's Merion, Fresh Meadow or Royal St. Georges? All wrong! Jack's choice for a real test of golf is the Durban Country Club in Natal, South Africa.

"I guess I've played 'em all or at least all the good ones," says Redmond, "but for the sternest test of them all I pick Durban."

"Durban, a comparatively short course with its 220-yard stretch, looks like a set-up to the casual observer, but just try it some time. You'd be pleased with the greens, as they are three or four times as large as those on the average American or English course. But stay out of the rough! Flanking the fairways at Durban is tough old seaweed that will disturb your golfing soul for months after you're gone. There's nothing quite like it, especially the first hole of 223 yards that starts along the Indian ocean. Pitfalls, hog-back greens, beautiful fairways and an brilliant, shimmering sunlight make it an ideal beauty spot."

CHAIRMAN FIXES DATE OF STATE CONVENTION

BOISE, Aug. 24 (AP)—Mrs. Frank Johnson of Boise, acting Democratic state chairman, today set at least any question about the date of the Democratic state convention saying it would be held in Halley August 30.

She said the attorney general had indicated that date was legally 15 days after the primary election of August 14, as required by law. The law provided that the platform convention shall be held not less than 16 days after the primary. She said some question had been raised as to whether August 29 or August 30 was legally the earliest date. To meet any possible question, she said it was likely adoption of the platform would be carried over until August 30, either by scheduling a meeting for that date or by carrying the meeting of the preceding day past midnight.

Mrs. Johnson will open the meeting in the absence of State Chairman T. A. Walters and will preside until a temporary chairman is elected.

DOGGE'S TAX PLAN FOR IDAHO ENCOUNTERS SNAG

BOISE, Aug. 24 (AP)—The state board of equalization today discovered it had no power to tax the Utah coal route whose cars are hauled through Idaho over the Oregon Short Line railroad from Utah.

Roy Dodge, tax advisor of the board, said he was determined to place a tax on the cars on the basis of a private car company, such as the Pacific Fruit Express, whose cars are taxed on a mileage basis.

However, after several prolonged discussions before the board the railroad explained that the cars were considered just as "mailing cars" or "other railroad lines" in spite of the fact they belonged to the Union Pacific system. For that reason, the railroad spokesman said, they can not be taxed in Idaho. All cars on the coal route, it was explained, are taxed in Utah.

The board was expected to adjourn for a brief session tomorrow while its acts as a board of canvassers, but because not all electors returns are in the canvassing board will not continue its session for several days.

Fossilized Remains of Ancient Animals Shipped from Hagerman To the Smithsonian Institution

HAGERMAN, Aug. 24—Thirty-six big, strong boxes containing over seven and one-half tons of fossilized bones, remains of prehistoric animals, said by scientists to have inhabited this section of Idaho more than a million years ago, were carefully packed in Hagerman during the past week and started on their way to the Smithsonian Institution, Washington, D. C.

The huge collection of Idaho's ancient inhabitants was gleaned by members of a scientific expedition, headed by Dr. C. L. Grafton of the Smithsonian Institution who, for the past two months, has been doing research work in the field-known as the old Hagerman Lake beds that lie in the barren sand hills across Snake river and about three miles west of the town of Hagerman.

Other members of the expedition were: C. F. Sternberg of the Kansas State College and O. B. Pearce of Elroy, Kansas. Elmer Cook of Hagerman who worked with previous expeditions here headed by Dr. J. W. Oldley of the Smithsonian Institution and a number of the earth scientists of the deposits in this vicinity, assisted in the search for fossils.

The collection, Dr. Grafton said, contains many specimens of ancient horse remains, (Pliopithecus Shoshonensis) that have been discovered in the field in large numbers. Sixty-five skulls of these animals were packed in the big boxes besides other parts of skeletons. Most of these specimens were taken from a deep excavation made in a big sand butte overlooking Snake river where erosion had gradually exposed the portions of fossilized bones and near where members of the expedition pitched their camp while here.

In addition to the horse specimens much good material of other animals of the Idaho formation of the late Pliocene period, something like a million years ago, were obtained, the scientist said. Of particular interest among these was the skull of a mastodon in a good state of preservation and parts of the skull of another of these huge animals. Also parts of the skulls of two primitive prong horn antelope, traces of which animals have previously been very meager in this field, were found.

"Research work of the expedition here has been very satisfactory," Dr. Grafton said, "and specimens obtained
