KIMBERLY SCHOOL PLANS NEW POLICY

Thomas Inaugurates Plans for Students Who Won't Go to College

KIMBERLY, Aug. 28 — On Thursday and Friday of this week, when students of the Kimberly high school come to the building to register, several new policies await them.

Each student, upon registration will be asked "are you going to college?" Parents will be required to answer the question for them.

The board of trustees is offering this year a "liberalized course" mainly for those students who do not intend to go to college after they are graduated from high school.

Algebra, geometry and two years of science and history are a thing of the past for the students that are not going on to college. The only subject any student will be required to study is four years of English. After he has finished his four years of high school he will receive a diploma which will say: "Graduated from high school and also recommended for college."

"Due to this 'new deal' liberalized course for those people who never intend to go to college, I anticipate a very large enrollment in agricultural, home economics, commerce and all vocational courses," said L. Thomas, superintendent of schools today.

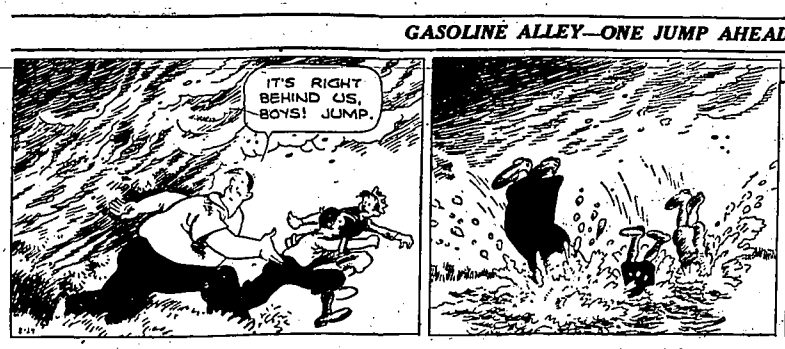
