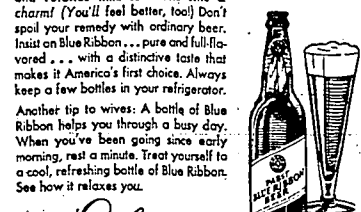

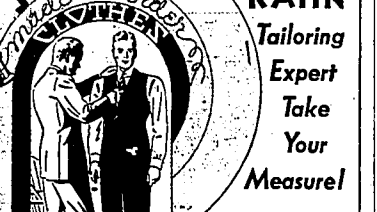

### CANDIDATES TELL CAMPAIGN COSTS

#### Twin Falls Man's Radio Broadcasts Take \$713 of \$1012

BOISE, Aug. 29.—(AP)—There was a rush of candidates Wednesday to file expense accounts with the secretary of state. The deadline for filing these accounts is next Tuesday evening.

Thomas E. Hackman, Twin Falls sealer for the Republican congressional nomination, reported total expenditures of \$702, of which \$713 went for radio hire. He spent \$50.13 in newspaper advertising, \$94 for filing fees and the remainder for other expenses.

The biggest postage bill yet was incurred by James A. Alliah, candidate for the supreme court, who handed the postmaster at Carson's \$1,074.50, or more than a third of his entire expense, for postage. Alliah spent \$338 of which \$30 was for filing fees, \$175 for clerks hire, \$30.15 for travel and the remainder for advertising.

Edward Campbell, mining nomination as state mine inspector on the Republican ticket, spent \$22 for filing fees and \$1 for postage. E. Hunt, candidate for district judge, spent \$40 for filing fees and 40 cents for postage.

In Democratic race—Lewis Williams, one of the unsuccessful ones in the Democratic congressional race in the Second district, expended \$332.25. Of this \$130 was for filing fees, \$75 for travel, \$69.50 for stationery and supplies and the remainder for newspaper advertising.

J. W. Keating, whose close race for the Republican nomination as state treasurer provided one of the most interesting of the primary, spent a total of \$61.05, of which \$33 was for filing fees and \$12.75 postage.

At cost E. O. Van Horn, Mead, \$554 to find out that First district Democratic preference—Whites for congress, Van Horn spent \$100 on advertising, \$300 for traveling and \$44 for filing fees. B. A. McDevitt, nominated for district judge in Pocentello, spent \$70, of which \$40 was for filing fees and \$21 for advertising.

BURLEY, Aug. 29.—Permits for firewood or timber to be taken from the Minidoka forest reserve must be procured from rangers and not from the forest office in Burley, announced Hugh Wilson, clerk in the office here. Those desiring wood or timber can find the rangers at their respective stations where permits will be issued.

Firewood can be gotten without a permit, unless gathered for sale to others. Dry wood for fuel for family use is free. Commercial wood haulers must pay for fuel, and for forest timber, they must pay for the regional fiscal agent, forest service and made payable in Salt Lake City. No other method of payment will be accepted.

Much firewood is now being hauled from the various forest sections which can be reached by truck or trailer. Horse drawn vehicles are also being made use of. Permits use the new Oakley-Rogerson road, the recently repaired road up Trappe creek and the road into Heglar canyon. Thirteen wood haulers were met on recent runs coming with loads out of Bozeman, and double that number is said to be frequently met in the Heglar district.

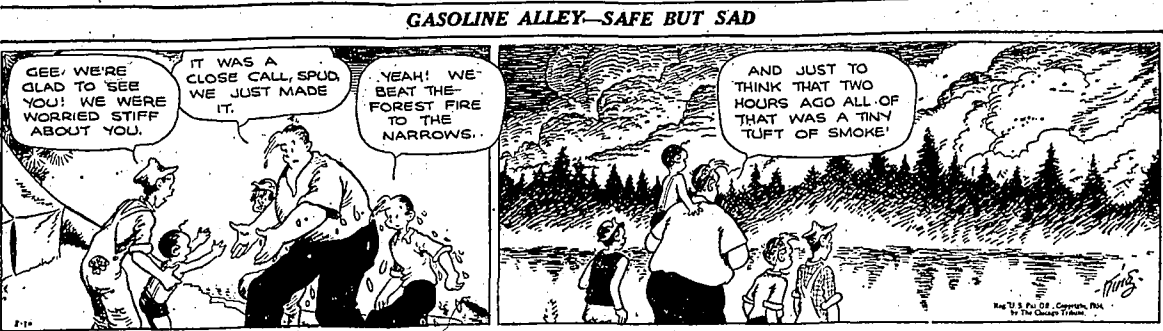

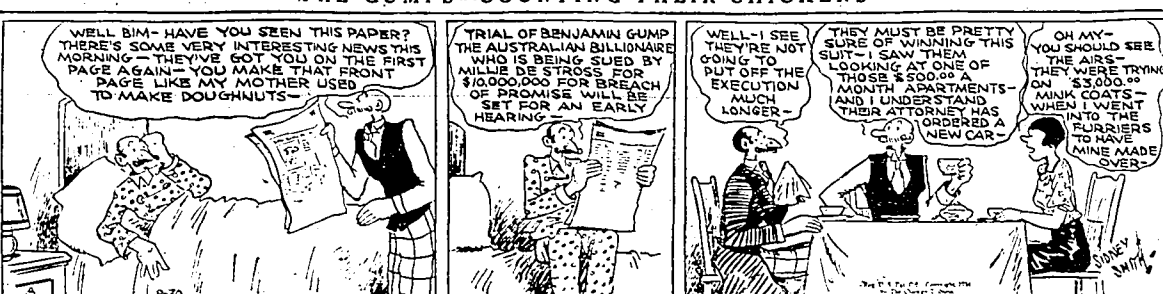

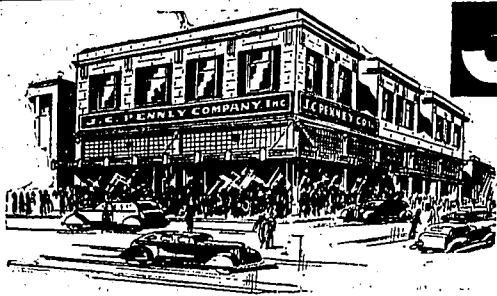
