TREASURY SHIFTS PUT UTAH MAN IN SPOTLIGHT AGAIN

Eclectic Name Again Figures In Morgenthau's Reshaping of Fiscal Advisers Corp as Bennett Resigns

(By The Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Sept. 8.—Secretary Morgenthau's reshaping of the corps of federal fiscal advisers into closer harmony with the New Deal's financial policies today added another important item to the list of resignations of treasury officials.

W. R. Stark, chief of the section of financial and economic research, a holdover from the Hoover administration, resigned his post. His resignation brought to three the major retirements during the present year that headed by Morgenthau. Immediately named George C. Haas, deputy governor of the farm credit administration since November 20, 1933, to serve as director of a new division of research and statistics. The new bureau will take over and expand that headed by Stark.

New Deal Development
With formidable problems of taxation and financing ahead, today's switch generally was regarded in Washington as part of the general move to place the staffing of treasury policies more closely in the hands of aides of the secretary of the treasury and who are entirely sympathetic with the president's program.

Stark's retirement followed by the resignation of Stark, the Douglas, director of the budget, and F. W. Lowery, assistant director of Douglas, since resigned. The resignation of the budget continued his mission today concerning his action.

The resignation of E. G. Bennett of Ogden, Utah, as a member of the federal deposit insurance board also was announced today by Secretary Crowley, FDIC chairman. It will become effective at the end of the month. This move, however, was considered having major significance, as Bennett has long been a strong proponent of resuming business and banking interests in Utah, which he is associated with Martin S. Eccles, special assistant to Morgenthau.

Bennett's resignation returns to private business, however, again raised speculation concerning the possibility that he would be named to succeed Eugene R. Black, former governor of the Federal Reserve board.

Ecclis, Gable Payor Less than a month ago, Black, known as an opponent of some New Deal financial policies, quit the board but announced he would continue to serve informally as a liaison man between the administration and the banks.

Elevation of Eccles to the Federal Reserve governorship would be considered some quarters as a possible indication of increased interest in legislation designed to place the banking system more directly under federal control.

Eccles, a wealthy man with extensive business and financial interests in Utah and elsewhere, does not hesitate to express distinctly adverse views on governmental credit and financing.

It is favorable to creation of a central bank of issue which has been under consideration by some treasury advisers.

The training of Haas, new treasury research head, has been chiefly in agricultural economics, although he served for two years in a research capacity with the Federal Reserve corporation. Haas holds a master of arts degree in agricultural economics from the University of Minnesota, and has pursued economic studies in Berlin.

"I saw the mistake I had made," he said. "I have been talking about a beautiful plan for the future. I have no love for dictators either of the right or left because I have no taste for rotting in a dungeon. So I decided to change my tactics to present a plan with an immediate application to the future."
The outgrowth, he said, was the "spot" plan. As he explained, it is the plan to buy the unsalable surplus of farmers and other producers with "various receipts receivable for taxes and for exchange at state stores." Unemployed workers of which there are 1,500,000 in California, would then be put to work in idle factories or on idle land which had been rented by the state. They would be paid in service certificates, exchangeable at the state stores.
The state stores would deal only with those holding receipts or certificates, and presumably receipts and certificates could be cashed only at state stores. Sinclair predicted, however, that if the plan worked, the certificates and receipts would be worth 200 per cent in dollars, within a short time.
The "spot" plan would involve only surplus and unemployed, Sinclair said, and private business would be on otherwise as at present.

THE GOODY FENBION
How would you like to be assured \$200 a month from the day you are sixty till you die?

This is the plan of Dr. F. E. Townsend of Long Beach, California. Dr. Townsend said he was taking care of the indigent poor of Long Beach for the last two years and has had therefore every chance to see how much benefit is in some sort of provision for the elderly people who have not been able to provide for themselves in those years when they can no longer earn.

The proposition worked out is that Congress appropriate funds for the first month as a revolving fund, to be replenished by a national sales tax. The theory is that the \$200 spent by one person every month will create one more job to supply increased demand for products. It is based on the fact that approximately 10,000,000 people will be eligible to apply for the pensions; but persons who incomes do not have to take the pensions, and those who, except them must retire from gainful endeavor.

At present, only eight per cent of people who reach 60 are provided for from their own resources. The rest are wholly dependent. It is likely that the day will come when earnings can be so distributed that substantial old age pensions become the normal thing. But this plan is a little sudden. The insurance man can find holes in it. And in spite of the awfulness with which it is sweeping the country, it has the look more of a beautiful theory than of a practical possibility.

UPTON SINCLAIR
California said it would like to "End Poverty in California" to the tune of some \$50,000,000 for Upton Sinclair in the Democratic primary. His nearest rival, leading only two-thirds as many, Frank P. Merriam, got the Republican ticket, polled something more than 300,000, far behind Sinclair's total.

This is the more amazing because Sinclair's platform is so definitely socialist. He proposes to have the state issue \$500,000,000 in bonds to purchase land and factories by right of eminent domain, to set aside unattended agricultural land and idle factories by condemnation proceedings, to have a state money authority handle the financing and to pay workers in these state factories and farms with scrip.

He would abolish the present state sales tax and impose an income tax instead. Income under \$5,000 would be exempt, but the tax would then rise sharply. An income of \$50,000 would pay 30 per cent. To needy persons over 60, to the blind and all others physically unable to earn, including widows with children, he would have the state pay \$50 per month.

These measures, Mr. Sinclair believes, will end poverty within half the four-year term of California's governor.

No one can deny that it would be a splendid thing to end poverty in California or anywhere else. If Sinclair is elected most no-lookers will certainly wish him well in his endeavor. But the possibility of undoing so speedily the results of so many centuries looks like a little bit dubious.

THE SIXTEEN MONTHS

(Milwaukee Journal)

The American League league organized to protect the liberties of Alfred E. Smith, John W. Davis, James W. Wadsworth, Nathan L. Miller, Irvin D. Starn and their like-minded friends, raises in some minds the old hope of a "new alignment" in party politics. Here are notable Republican and Democratic figures getting together across party lines, not as party men but as conservatives.

Secretary Charles of the Interior is hopeful. Today we have different groups in each party. We like to see all progressives together and all conservatives together. Then you always would be facing your enemy and not wondering about what was happening behind your back.

It is an ideal party division ought to be on real lines of human dignity. But the overdue reform will hardly be realized by this select movement to "save the constitution."

The politicians will be afraid of it. They know their colors. They know what would happen to a national party that lagged itself "conservative" in any coalition with a party named "progressive." All the hosts of Wall street at one end; the humane and enlightened statesmen at the other. It will not work unless you have an overpowering issue, like a danger which all can recognize.

But surely a threat to the constitution is a real danger and men who want to conserve an fundamental liberties have a real issue to take the Republicans and Democrats could unite to save the country from crony money, will they not? Will they even more readily to save the constitution?

It sounds all right until someone asks what part of the constitution do you want to save? And for whom? The benefit of the party for some money in 1940 was the only reason for the party's interest in the constitution. It is not to save the country, but to save the party. Both North and South were to save it in 1900. The South thought slavery a fundamental liberty; the North thought it would destroy the union.

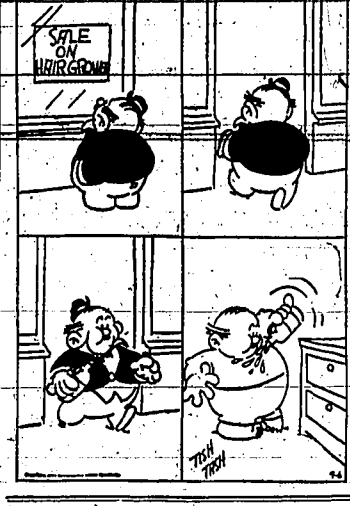
The practical politician doesn't want to belong to a party labeled "conservative." And the practical voter wants to know what is to be conserved. The sight of Jimmy Watson, the old guard, in the same boat with all this new stuff, is a sobering sight. It is not and toward that point does he steer. These men are able, shrewd, thoughtful. We think they more than do some good. But so far as a new political alignment goes—no notions that Glass, Byrd, Bailey, Gore, all Democratic senators, all critics of the administration, aren't joining up.

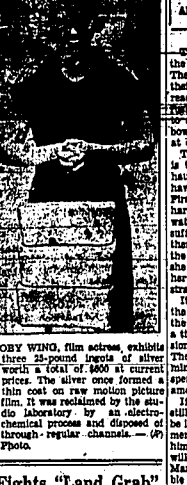
