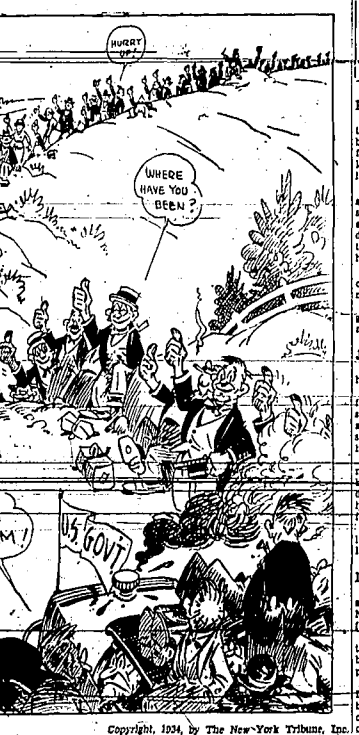
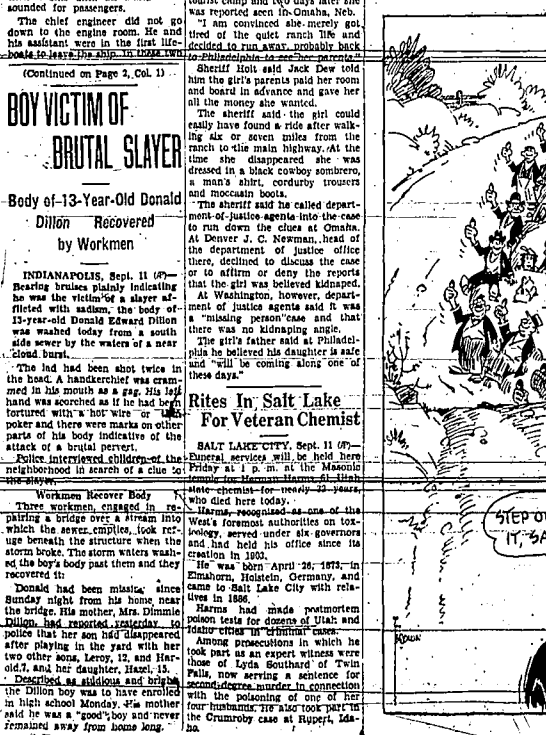

SENATE MUNITIONS INQUIRY CONTINUES DESPITE PROTESTS

Secretary Hull Discusses Diplomatic Objections With Committee; Probe Described as 'Righteous'

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—Sharp objections were raised and inquiries from other governments caused Secretary Hull to discuss the matter with the senate committee today, but the state committee today said the investigation would go right ahead.

Secretary Hull disclosed at a press conference later he had no intention of interfering with the work of the committee. He called the inquiry "righteous" one.

A committee member said that one of the subjects taken up by the committee was testimony to be given tomorrow by officials of the Du Pont company, who will discuss the evidence which caused many verifications.

Senator Nye, in a letter made public by Hull, pointed out that the frequent mention by munitions agents of government officials did not necessarily mean that they necessarily reflected "the opinion of the committee."

The committee with Hull called only occasionally the committee's inquiry into munitions attempts made by the Curtis-Wright corporation to obtain munitions.

Senator Bone (D-Wash) added: "This is an investigation of the munitions business, not merely into the morals of government."

### U. S. POTATO CROP OVER LAST YEAR'S

#### Government Figures Indicate Heavier Production Despite Drouth

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—Despite reduced crops in drouth-stricken western producing states, potato production was estimated by the agriculture department Monday to be above last year's.

The total production for the country was estimated at 337,141,000 bushels, or nearly 17,000,000 more than in 1933, but less than the average production from 1927 to 1931 by more than 28,000,000 bushels.

An average improvement was noted in spite of continued reduction of the crop in the western states, where the crop report said the effect of the long limited irrigation water, lack of rainfall and excessive temperatures was to reduce the crop. Production in the 10 western surplus states was estimated to be about 15,200,000 bushels above 1933 production, while the five central states are expected to produce about 7,600,000 bushels more than their short crop of last year and the three eastern states about 9,600,000 bushels more than their 1933 production.

**Increase in Early Crop**

More than half of the indicated 16,800,000 bushel increase over last year's United States production occurred in the early states which have completed their marketings from this year's crop, nearly 8,500,000 bushels more than in 1933. The intermediate states also increased their production about 4,800,000 bushels.

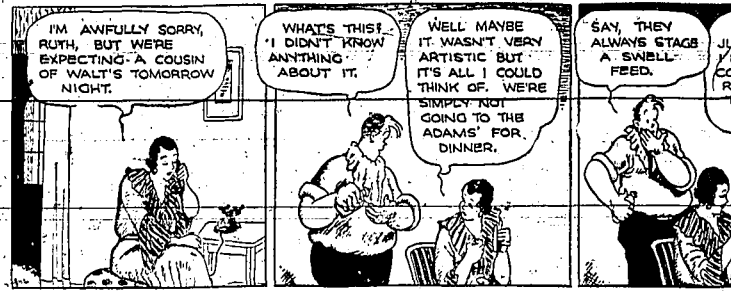

### PLANNERS SUGGEST MAP OF INVENTORY

#### Topographical Survey and Housing Program Backed by Planning Board

Possible for a city inventory survey, a detailed housing program for the unemployed, a sewer system in South Park, a municipal water supply, a municipal swimming pool and a few other matters were discussed last night at the newly formed Twin Falls city planning commission in its first regular session in the city council chambers. When the lengthy session had finally come to a close, two resolutions had been passed and presented to the city council at its next regular meeting Monday evening.

The commission recommended that the council request an EFPA project for a city inventory map at an estimated cost of \$3000. With an exception of \$100 for materials, the entire cost of the project would go to the EFPA. It also recommended that the council request an EFPA project for the services of an architect to draw plans and to five estimates on houses for the prospective housing project.

#### Check 'Underground'

The inventory map would be the result of a topographical survey which would explain in detail every inch of ground on the city and extend in the air, sewer and water lines would be checked as well as zoning conditions and other matters of interest to the welfare of Twin Falls. The map would be prepared to show all these things in detail.

Location of plots for the building of houses was left to a committee, named to meet with the Twin Falls county commissioners to find out what jobs are available from the county lands.

#### Need Sewer System

A sewer system for South Park was voted as a necessity and it was anticipated that the situation will be in a better shape for action if the inventory map is prepared.

#### Members of the commission voted the need of a new municipal water supply, but all seemed reluctant to take any definite steps until the state commissioner of reclamation voices an opinion on the city's protest against the proposed location of the Twin Falls canal company turn the water out of the company's canals during the winter months, thereby reducing the present source of city water.

#### Plans for disposal signs to be placed at the entrance of Main street and the truck lane, were taken under consideration.
