(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, Sept. 13—A rescue ship, off a ranking officer, who had sharply criticized their master for delay in sending lifeboats and other rescue equipment, were called tonight before a federal grand jury investigating the disaster.

They testified earlier, before a department of commerce inquiry, that the dollar liner, President Cleveland might have saved additional lives if Captain J. Carey had not waited 46 minutes after arriving at the scene before ordering rescue boats to be lowered.

URGES LOCAL AIR SERVICE: It is interesting to note that Louis Marcus, mayor of Salt Lake, in addressing Twin Falls business men at a banquet Wednesday night, devoted a major part of his speech to the need of air mail service between the two cities and, incidentally, the need of adequate landing field facilities in Twin Falls.

Recently, as a culmination of months of effort, Idaho Falls celebrated in record style the securing of an air mail stop there. As a preliminary step Idaho Falls established a municipal airport, equipping the same in line with Department of Commerce requirements so that planes of all kinds may land in safety and the name of Idaho Falls be carried on the Department's lists of commercial airports.

Twin Falls, on the contrary, has studiously declined to pay any attention whatever to the matter of an airport and its many advantages to the city. Some years ago as a means of laying the foundation for such a project the local Chamber of Commerce leased ground for the purpose and maintained what might have been easily expanded into a first class landing field. During the past year or so the Chamber has been unable to longer carry the burden and the field has been allowed to get along as best it can.

Nearly every town in Idaho in any manner comparable to Twin Falls in point of population, and many others much smaller have well kept airports. Twin Falls, almost alone, lags behind.

Some day perhaps we may decide to give this subject the attention it deserves.

AMERICAN VITALITY

An American newspaper man, just returned to the United States after a world tour of some months' duration, announces that he is "over more sharply conscious of the advantages of living in America" than he has been after more than a dozen other summers in Europe or the Orient. Then he proceeds to enumerate the advantages, some of which are superior plumbing, physical comfort in trains, hotels and homes and a general cleanliness and efficiency.

He lists the ills from which he knows his own land is suffering—drouth, crop failures, unemployment, labor troubles, poverty, hunger, gangsters. Whatever they are, they are worse elsewhere. And to combat American ills there are "resolution, kindness, resourcefulness, enterprise and strength."

"There is no pathos or failure of hope in the outward aspects of America, nor in the feeling of its people, as you see or sense them freshly after a long absence. It is an affirmative and vital spirit that meets you in New York, that accompanies you on the train, that rests with you in a typical large American city."

Just lately Americans who have not been away from the country have felt there was a new wave of gloom and fear washing over us. It is good to know that this is not apparent to the home-comer. That wave of gloom is just one more thing that isn't as bad as it seems.

THEY HAVE THE KEY

"As a result of the World War," said George Melcher, Superintendent of Schools of Kansas City, to his teachers just before school began, "we have thrown all the industries into a state of chaos; we have plunged all nations into debt; we have made the currencies of the world of unstable value,

and we have demonstrated again the truth of Sherman's saying, 'War is Hell.'

"But deep in the background is a more heartening picture. More progress has been made in science and technology than in any preceding century. Great developments have come in physics, chemistry, biology, surgery, medicine, adding to the comfort and happiness and well-being of man. The world is rapidly adding to its resources in art, music, literature and other fine arts.

"Progress in science, industry and culture depends on education. The progress of the world depends on education. The safety and happiness of the world depend on education. And it is you, molding the minds and careers of America's children, who have the key.

"Despite the destructive forces of war and hate, the constructive forces of industry and culture are at work and there is hope that the leavening influence of the cultural forces will save the world."

This is a large order for an auditorium full of pretty young school teachers. But in helping Johnny and Jane to think straight and play fair they will be doing their share to fill it.

"YOU GOT TO GET UP"

Recent news dispatches in the falling of a number of CCC boys in Tennessee who, tired of the constant disruption of their slumbers by the camp bugler, decided to catch him and paint him green. It is another reminder that the bugler, despite his limited musical speech, is a most versatile instrument in the heat of battle it can spur men to feats of superhuman courage. Retreat of the colors, at sundown, is an inspiration. The bugler's playing of a sleeping camp or over the grave of a fallen comrade, is solemnly beautiful.

But what ex-sergeant man will forget the baneful wail of "dis-calm" just as the gray dawn is breaking, the complaint symphony of reveille, like some puffed-up barnyard rooster's salutation to the sun; the "birds of danger" symphony in drill hall and fatigue camp; the impatient grating of assembly; the calm scorn of "you're in the army now" with its assurance that "you'll never get rich."

No; even while contemplating a bugler green as reprehensible, which it certainly is, few war veterans can honestly deny a secret elation that at last somebody "obeys that impulse."

MOB-HOGS

My dear Editor: I was just talking with a friend of mine who was in the office from outside. He had just received a government check for \$10,000 for not raising hogs this year. This idea of not raising hogs appeals to me very strongly and I am thinking seriously of buying a farm and not raising myself some hog. Someone told me you had some farms you wanted to sell, so I am writing to ask you about them, and also can you give me some advice as to the best kind of a farm not to raise hogs on; the best strain of hogs not to raise; and how best to keep an inventory of the same. 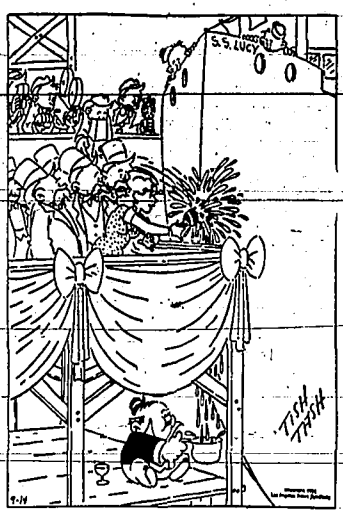
