



**NEW SURPLUS OF LIVESTOCK LOOMS**

**AAA Representatives and Agricultural Interests Study Problem**

**SALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 15 (AP)**—Representatives of the AAA and of agricultural interests here today considered the danger of a new surplus in the next two years of livestock and of stock feeds.

The danger was emphasized by officials of the AAA, holding a special regional conference over the country. Such uncontrolled production would cause a swing into conditions that existed before the war, reduced stocks of feed and farm animals.

As a result of the discussion here today and of similar conferences that have attended elsewhere, Dillon B. Myers, chief of the AAA committee division at Washington, said the sentiment appears to favor direct control of the production of livestock. **Congressman Part In 'Rubber Stamp' Body**

Representative James M. Beck, Republican, has night announced he would return from congress at the outbreak of the rubber stamp body because it has largely ceased to be an independent body.

Beck, widely known as an authority on the constitution, said "under present conditions congress is merely a rubber stamp for the executive, and to be one-fourth hundredth part of a rubber stamp no longer appeals to me."

The former collector general of the United States added that congress has not only unilaterally delegated to the president its chief legislative powers, but in respect to more important emergency legislation it has yielded to the minority any adequate opportunity to debate public questions.

Beck said he was retiring because he believed he could help "the great cause" more effectively in the federal courts, than in a congress where the minority is gagged and reduced to impotence.

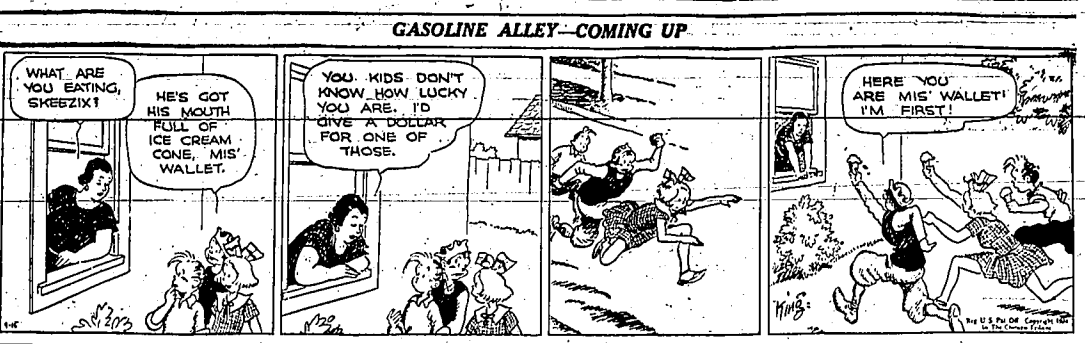
