BULLHORN REPLACES HORSESHOE AS CHIEF OF FERA IN IDAHO

State Relief Committee Names P. C. Meredith New Administrator; Governor Gets Controlling Voice

(By The Associated Press) BOISE, Sept. 15.—E. P. Horaffal of Pocatello was displaced today by the state relief committee as Idaho FERA administrator and P. C. Meredith of Buhl was appointed his successor.

Horaffal's transfer to other duty in the administration came as the climax to a summer of conflict between the FERA and Governor Ross who repeatedly protested in public that the relief organization was "too heavy" with officials and inefficient in aiding workmen on the relief list.

Ends Ouster Rumors The replacement of Horaffal ended rumors current for several weeks that he would be ousted in a clash with Governor Ross began with the removal of the relief administration from the state relief offices. In the statehouse it had been closely supervised by the chief executive.

The change of administrators was accompanied by a change of policy under which the relief committee, appointed by the governor, will have active control of the work. Chairman Lane said the committee would meet two times a week to pass on all major operations of the organization.

Controlling Voice Issue, Hinkley emphasized that the governor and the committee would have a controlling voice in the administration. Hinkley said the administration of relief in Idaho, regardless of the conflict, will be under the control of the state relief committee.
