COMMUNISTS HURL INSULTS AT QUEEN

Members of Netherlands Parliament Jailed, Later Released

THE HAGUE, Netherlands, Sept. 18—Three Communist members of parliament who shouted insults after Queen Wilhelmina finished a speech in the Netherlands were arrested and jailed today as an infuriated crowd tried to get at them.

Police led the men to prison by a secret route. Later they were released.

It was the first time in the history of the Netherlands that members of parliament were arrested in the course of a session.

Police Fight Demonstrations The disturbance was the culmination of a disorder outside as the queen was approaching to open parliament. Ten automobiles loaded with demonstrators tried to break up the royal parade, but they were fought off by police.

There was general disappointment that the queen did not make the expected announcement of the engagement of Princess Juliana.

Many citizens have accepted as fact the persistent reports that the queen has been engaged to Prince Bertil of Sweden.

The queen reaffirmed the firmness of the Netherlands for the gold standard currency.

THE SEA SCANDAL

The shame of the Morro Castle revelations is almost as great a tragedy as the fire itself. The first reaction of the public, eager to believe in heroism amid peril, and to give the best possible construction to doubtful facts, has changed to angry condemnation.

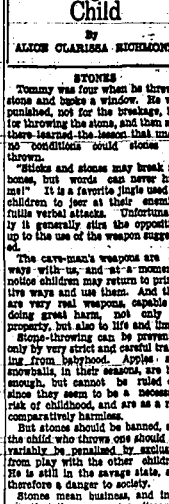

DIETRICH SCHOOL CUTTIED BY FLAMES

Damage to Structure Estimated at \$60,000; Cause Unknown

DIETRICH, Sept. 18.—Fire, spread by a raging windstorm, today destroyed the school building this afternoon. Total damage was estimated at \$60,000. Nothing but the walls of the three-story brick structure remains standing. High school and grade school sections were first to go and the flames finally got to the \$15,000 new gymnasium, nearing completion. No one was injured in the fire.

Cause of the fire is not known. Some declare that it was caused from mice in the building. Others immediately were hurried outside. Without fire equipment and with water except that in the school's 45-pound pressure tank, the blaze could not be brought under control. Nothing was saved except a few books and papers.

The gymnasium, valued for members of the football team at \$15,000 and \$20,000, was completely gutted. It was not yet completed and was being constructed by PWA funds in conjunction with a \$6000 bond issue in the district. The gym was attached to the east side of the building and was the last to go.

Immediately following the fire, plans were formulated to continue school beginning Monday at the community church, the Grange hall and in other buildings donated for that purpose by members of the community.

JEROME INCREASES SCHOOL ENROLLMENT

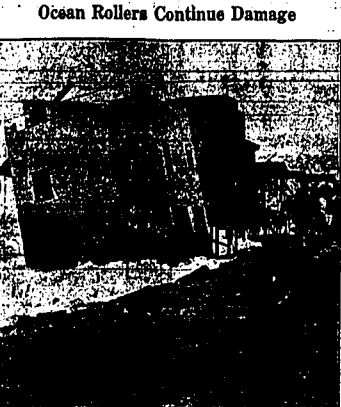
