

WESTERN DETAIL TRADE IMPROVES
Sales Exceed National Average Gain Over Last Year

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 19 (AP)—Trade is shown by latest reports to be exceeding the national average gain over last year for the first time this year.

Chicago alone checked at 20 principal firms throughout the western district, were 8 per cent above the level of last year. August figures showed the national average was 2 per cent better than a year ago.

Trapp, whose praise of the engine room crew was echoed by Dickerson, N. Brown, head of the steamboat inspection service and conductor of the inquiry, read aloud evidence the copy of orders he scratched down from the bell sheet as the crew down below perished in his intense heat and smoke.

COURT RELEASES "HOT" OIL CARGO

Fletcher Company to Sell Gasoline Involved in NRA Dispute

BOISE, Sept. 19.—An order permitting the Fletcher Oil company to unload the two oil tankers holding \$200,000 of gasoline at the harbor in Seattle was issued today by United States District Judge C. C. Cavanaugh as the conclusion of a test suit involving the seizure of the national recovery act aimed at preventing shipment of "hot oil."

The suit was initiated by the department of the interior.

The order, arrived at by stipulation, concluded an action which has cost the Fletcher company, owned by two brothers and the widow of a third, between \$50,000 and \$75,000 in demurrage charges and other expenses in connection with the restraining order preventing movement of the two ships. The suit cost the Fletcher company demurrage on the tankers from August 25 until today at the rate of between \$5000 and \$7000 daily.

Starts Pump in Seattle
Immediately the release order was given, a telephone message started pumps in Seattle to unload the cargo into company tanks ashore, officers of the organization reported here.

Judge Cavanaugh in two previous rulings in the case upheld the constitutionality of the act and continued the restraining order in effect until today's decision. He urged Monday, however, that an agreement be reached between federal attorneys and Fletcher counsel to save the expense. The present agreement resulted.

Under terms of the order the company may unload the gasoline and sell it in its regular business channels but may not use it to disrupt or "break" the market.

In the suit for a restraining order the government contended much of the gasoline in the two tankers was refined from oil produced by an east Texas company in excess of quantities fixed by that state. Under the 1920 oil conservation law, the president was authorized to prohibit movement in interstate commerce of petroleum or its products in excess of the quotas fixed by state governments.

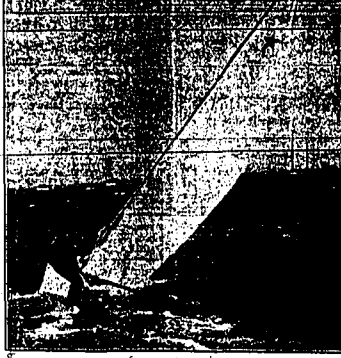

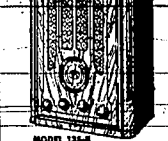

AAA FUTURE HANGS ON CROP-HOG VOTE

Contract Farmers to Say Whether Crop Control Still Continuance

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—The fate of the agricultural adjustment administration, rather than being determined by some future act of congress or of President Roosevelt, may be settled by the referendum which has been proposed for crop-hog contract farmers this fall.

The "referendum" principle originally was written into the so-called "compulsory" Bankhead cotton and Kerr tobacco bills.

By terms of the Bankhead bill, contracts made under the so-called 1933 cotton crop unless the growers made their own arrangements to purchase cotton would automatically terminate on Sept. 1, 1934.

Three-fourths of the growers must approve before the Kerr tobacco bill can be applied to next year's crop.

The only vote for basic commodity to which the AAA has applied is a national-wide control scheme which will therefore, is wheat. Wheat growers in the fall of 1933 agreed up to reduce production 10 per cent in 1934.

Wheat planters would automatically contract for the AAA crop control bill.

Should crop-hog growers vote to cancel or to throw overboard the whole cotton and tobacco adjustment administration, the AAA program would be a real pain.

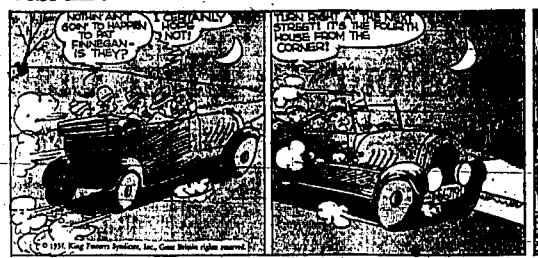

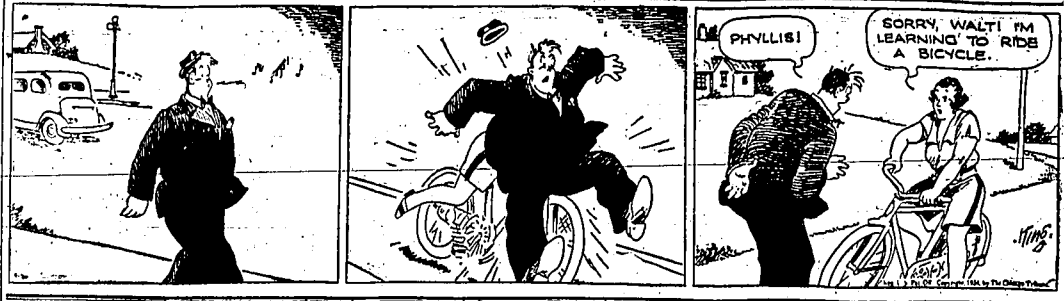
