

MILLION HOMES ON HOUSING PROGRAM

Plans Made for Release of Funds Told by Administrator Moffett

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20 (AP)—An intention to release the funds on November 1 for the construction of at least one million new homes was announced last night by James A. Moffett, federal housing administrator.

He made that assertion in a speech prepared for radio broadcasting which was to open the electric show in Madison Square Garden, New York, and which was relayed to Hearst Radio Station, New York, and to his explorers in the Antarctic.

The organization work for the "1,000,000 or more homes this country actually needs." Moffett said the program will be carried out in accordance with all the most consistent with safety and efficiency.

Unemployed Field
"In this plan for construction of entirely new homes we are venturing into an uncharted field," he said, "therefore, our rules and regulations must be drawn with care and under way by November 1."

Financial support, he said, has come from 7,000 banks with a total of \$22,000,000,000 in credit facilities throughout the union which have signed up to make repair and modernization loans.

Concerning the home modernization and repair phase of the program, the administrator declared that more than 1,000 communities have set up or are setting up committees to direct the program.

FORD GIVES LITTLE WEIGHT TO DOINGS AT WASHINGTON

NEW YORK, Sept. 20—Henry Ford in the "American Magazine" today declared that what "goes on" in the capital is of no great importance, one way or the other.

"Some people say that the politicians in Washington are saving the country," wrote the industrialist. "Others say they are ruining the country. I don't agree with either side."

"My belief is that what goes on in the capital is of no great importance. It is a law of nature that the country. We are too strong and resourceful a people to be hampered much by legislation. Nothing can hurt the United States."

Pressure on Legislature
And in these words Ford, one of the nation's greatest mass-producers, dealt with, surprises and over-optimism.

"Most people think nowadays of the surplus as an evil. It is said to break the market. It drives down prices. Therefore, they say, the surplus should be destroyed, and the future production of the commodity strictly limited."

"This view, I think, is short sighted and mistaken. The surplus is a benefit."
