Walkout Leaders List Gains in President's Settlement Plan; End to 'Stretchout,' New Wage and Hours Fixing Basis, Removal of Disputes From NRA Jurisdiction

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23 (AP)—The great textile strike is ended. Hundreds of thousands of workers who supported the withdrawal of their labor, tonight were ordered by those leaders to man the looms Monday. Their decision to terminate the most gigantic walkout of modern times followed a thorough story and discussion of a settlement plan advanced by the Wilson arbitration board and endorsed by President Roosevelt. Strike Headquarters Joseph L. Bristle resigned at Bristle-Hobart today.
