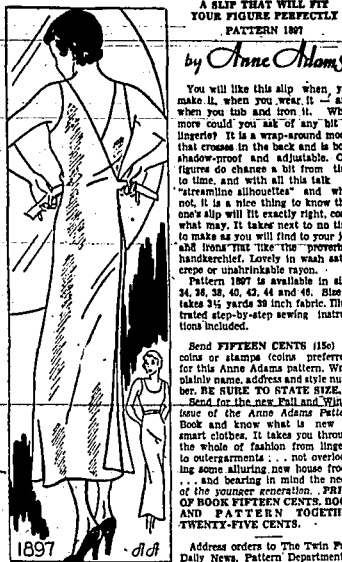

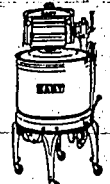

AN OPPORTUNITY

Those persons who have it in mind to fix up their homes or business property against the snows of winter will do well to consider the advantages which are offered by the National Housing Act, machinery for the administration of which has been set up in Twin Falls with Captain J. W. Porter as general chairman.

To those who have cash which may be devoted to this purpose the National Housing Act offers nothing but the homeowner who desires to improve his property and yet cannot spare the money for the purpose in a lump sum is given an opportunity to go ahead just the same by borrowing the money and repaying it in conveniently small monthly installments.

The plan differs from the ordinary bank loan in that installment repayments are definitely provided for. Any sum from two or three hundred dollars up to two thousand may be applied for and the same method of repayment governs. Because of this feature the plan has much to recommend it.

In a major sense the chief advantages offered by the National Housing Act form of loan lies in the fact that so many individuals and lines of business will share in the benefits of the expenditure. A fresh source of employment will be opened up, lumber and building materials of all kinds will be used, properties will take on added value and the entire town will share in the improvements brought about.

And it is understood, the Federal government urges the making of these loans.

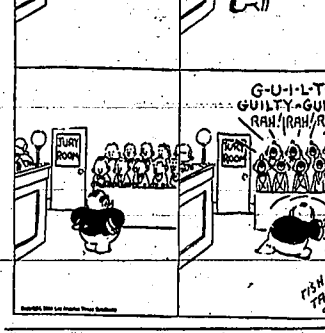
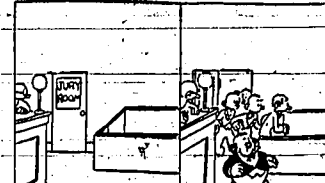
WILL SWAP

Senator James P. Pope, returning to Idaho from Washington, D. C., said here last evening that in his judgment evidence brought out at recent hearings before the senate munitions investigation committee "clearly indicates that the government must establish a monopoly for manufacture of the munitions of war or that there must be enactment of stringent regulations of private industry engaged in munitions manufacture." Senator Pope is a member of the munitions committee.

Throughout the middle-west, he said, there are evidences of general support for the proposition of continuing corn-hog production control program, which, he said, has increased in favor with recent increases in the price of pork, and the distribution of corn-hog allotment payments.

"Farmers throughout the middle-west are much encouraged, and conditions all are much improved," the senator said.

He pointed to mineral development during the past year bringing considerable benefits of Idaho's states of gold, silver and lead.

In comparison with the states of Oregon and Washington which have received large allotments of federal funds for hydro-electric development, Idaho has not participated on a big scale in distribution of government money, the senator said. But, he added, in comparison with other western states, Idaho's share has been generous.

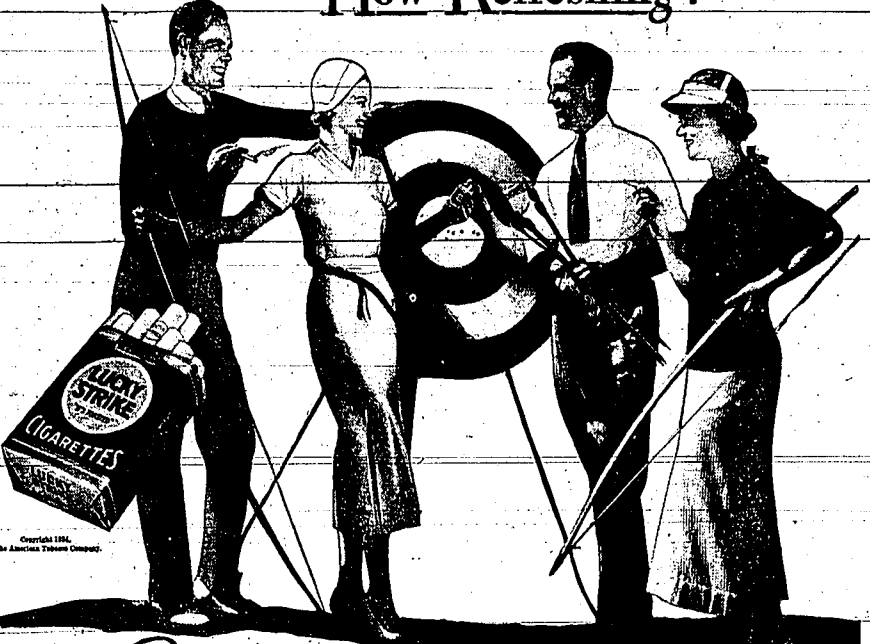
