WOOL FROM OUR EYES

"The trouble behind the senatorial arms investigation," writes Paul Mallon, "is that no one knows what can be done about it." There is little hope that the manufacture of munitions can soon become either a government-owned or controlled industry.

There might, however, be one very good effect to follow the investigation—the removal of large amounts of wool from the eyes of the general public. Surely, after the daily revelations concerning the selfishness and ruthlessness of the munitions business, the common people in many lands will develop a wholesome cynicism about war propaganda and war news.

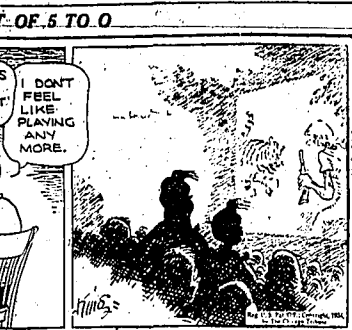
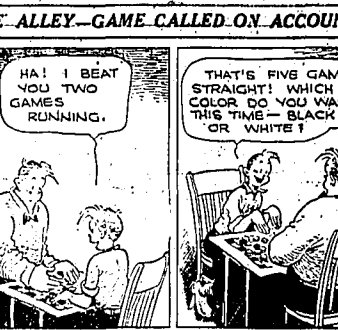
