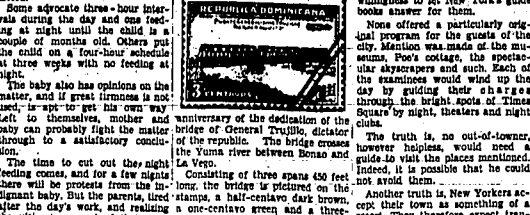

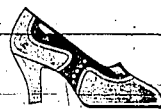

President's Planners Encounter Sharply Divided Opinions

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26 (AP)—Coming clashes in congress over social legislation were forecast today in sharply divided opinions encountered by experts who are gauging data for the president's cabinet on economic security.

Varying viewpoints already have developed in consideration of old-age pension plans. Unemployment insurance now finds at least two clearly defined schools of thought.

One holds for a system of individual plant reserves built up in prosperous times to tide workers over depressions; the other contemplates a national fund of the European kind.

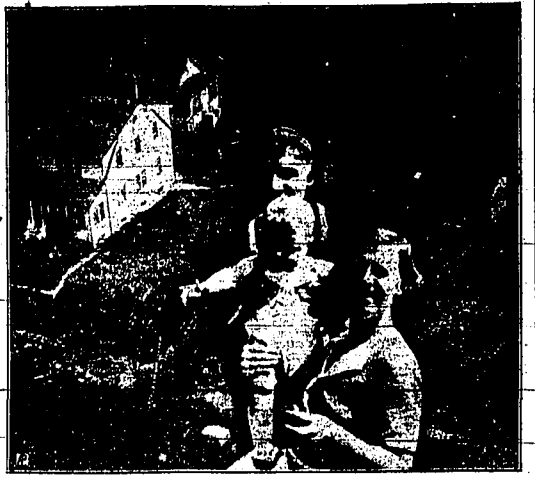

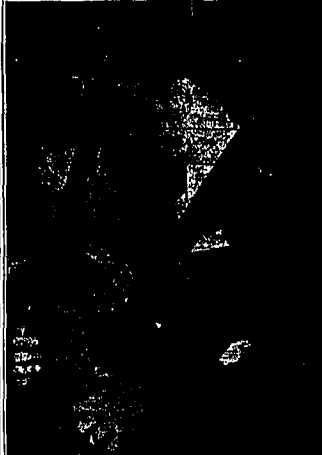
